

Group in Fallujah, Iraq, when his vehicle was struck by an RKG-3 grenade. HM3 Rohn sustained severe damage to both his legs in the blast. After two years of limb salvage, he decided to have doctors amputate his right leg.

On March 26, 2011, near the end of a combat deployment to Sangin, Afghanistan with the 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines, Navy Hospital Corpsman 3rd Redmond Ramos was serving with the Fleet Marine Force when a fellow Marine stepped on an improvised explosive device (IED). Ramos



Bystanders were disturbed that there were children and adults in the area and cars driving by as the man was fully exposed.


A CHP officer who was close by was also flagged down by a motorist and arrived at the scene to assist.

was maneuvering to assist the injured Marine when he triggered another IED. He lost his left leg below the knee and sustained other injuries in the blast.

The Community Kickoff signifies the start of the build process and will introduce these two veterans to the community.

The homes being built for these

two veterans will feature more than 40 major special adaptations such as widened doorways for wheelchair access, a roll-in shower, and kitchen amenities that include pull-down shelving and lowered countertops.

The homes will also alleviate the mobility and safety issues associated with a traditional home, including navigating a wheelchair through narrow hallways or over thresholds, riding on carpets, or reaching for cabinets that are too high. All costs for these homes will be covered by Homes For Our Troops and its network of donors. supporters and corporate partners.

HFOT has built 373 homes since the organization's inception in 2004. Homes For Our Troops relies on contributions from donors, supporters, and corporate partners for the building of each veteran's home. Community members may hold fundraisers or make donations.

### Healthcare priorities

### **Assemblymember Marie**

Waldron' 75th District

I am a strong advocate for expanded access to healthcare, including mental health and Substance Use Disorder (SUD) treatments. These issues frequently come before the Assembly Health Committee, where I serve as Vice Chair.

This session, I introduced Assembly Bill 1944, which seeks to create a safe pathway for patients with rare and ultra-rare diseases seeking investigational treatments designed just for them, despite the usual costly and extremely timeconsuming FDA approval process.

I also supported SB 496, which requires health insurers including Medi-Cal to cover biomarker testing that results in targeted therapy for diagnosis and treatment, therapies that have proven very effective for cancer patients.

I serve on the Select Committee on Fentanyl, Opioid Addiction, and Overdose Prevention. Thousands of lives lost in San Diego County, many from accidental overdoses, could be saved if antidotes were readily available. Last year I introduced AB 1233, which facilitates the availability of opioid antagonist drugs (antidotes) in tribal communities, many of which have been ravaged by the fentanyl

California's mental health needs are staggering, but the Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) hasn't been significantly changed in 20 years. Almost one in seven adults (about 4.4 million people) 621,000) experience some form of mental illness.

One in 26 adults and one in 14 children have trouble functioning in their daily activities. Necessary MHSA updates include expansion of services for those suffering with SUDs, allowing MHSA funding for SUD treatments, and additional community support for prevention

and early intervention. Mental health and SUDs are major contributors to homelessness and crime. Expanding care may be costly up front, but societal benefits of less crime and recidivism, reduced homelessness and restored lives will be incalculable.

We have to get a handle on these problems – there is no alternative. During my remaining time in the Legislature, those efforts will continue.



### Prop I

### **Supervisor Jim Desmond** 5th District

During our Jan. 23 Board of Supervisors meeting, we delved into the details of Proposition 1, which is on the March ballot. I want to provide a recap of our discussion.

I expressed reservations about Proposition 1's approach despite recognizing some potential benefits. The proposal seeks to rearrange funds from the county and give them to the state. This reallocation would decrease funding to our county, as highlighted by the analysis from the nonpartisan Legislative Analyst's

I emphasized the importance of resources for individuals grappling with addiction, a group previously overlooked under the Mental Health Services Act. While acknowledging the necessity for additional support in areas such as housing and infrastructure, I voiced skepticism about the proposed \$6.4 billion bond. I am concerned about the longterm financial burden on taxpayers, estimated to reach approximately \$10 billion over 30 years.

I believe the rise in homelessness is from failed policies rather than a lack of money, as the State of California has spent over \$20 billion on homelessness yet has seen it rise dramatically. I believe that the root causes of homelessness are linked to ineffective policies hindering access to essential assistance.

Additionally, I am apprehensive about the potential loss of local control, with decision-making authority shifting to the state, which may not adequately address the unique needs of San Diego County.

Furthermore, I raised concerns about the proposed housing-first approach and its applicability to all scenarios, particularly those involving individuals with severe mental illness. I fear a potential reduction in funding for crucial county services such as outpatient care, crisis response, prevention, and

suicide services. In summary, while I recognize some positive aspects of Proposition 1, I doubt its overall impact, particularly its financial implications and the potential loss of local control.




Fallbrook's Jaxon Dent is tagged out while sliding home during the varsity boys baseball game against the El Camino Wildcats, Feb. 29.





## Local hero recognized for Take Steps campaign

The Crohn's & Colitis Foundation has named Fallbrook resident Jerica Sanford its Take Steps 2024 Honored Hero for its "largest and most impactful fundraising event." The foundation's website says, "Take Steps is a walk experience that brings communities together letting inflammatory bowel disease (IBD) patients and their families know that they're not alone."

The event is scheduled for June 2 at NTC Park at Liberty Station in Point Loma with opening ceremonies at 10 a.m. Sanford's goal is "to bring awareness to what ulcerative colitis is and how it can drastically alter someone's life, which is why I am walking and raising funds in an effort to show hope (this is my seventh walk)."

Now through March 18, all donations to the walk will be matched up to \$100,000.

Sanford explained that "This disease is hard, unpredictable and life altering. But together as an IBD community we keep taking steps, raising funds and creating and generating that awareness to help future generations with the goal of a cure. To be very clear, there is no cure, only drugs that may or may not work as everyone's genetic makeup is so different. This is not a cookie cutter disease and there are no cookie cutter solutions. It is all trial and error.'

Sanford was diagnosed with ulcerative colitis at age 27 in April 2014, almost 10 years ago, and it "undoubtedly changed my entire life," she said, "Like many, I was misdiagnosed in the beginning. It took seeing three different GI doctors before someone understood my symptoms, and scheduled my first colonoscopy."

During that first hospitalization, she was given heavy doses of pain medications and after days of testing, scopes, bowel preps and more colonoscopies, she was given her first biologic infusion.

"Nothing was helping and I spent weeks at Pomerado Hospital. I was then given a second dose of the same biologic a week and a half after my first infusion. The second infusion almost killed me. I had a life-threatening reaction, and was told less than 1% of the population have had this reaction to this biologic infusion," Sanford

"It was after my first near death experience, that my mother would strongly encourage me to seek another route as medications nearly took my life...I made the decision to decline further medications. This was when I asked for my care to be transferred to the best in SoCal, and I would transition my care to the IBD team at UC San Diego," she explained.

She began undergoing the required procedures to have her colon removed, but she developed a life-threatening infection and suffered more allergic reactions to new medications.

Sanford said, "2014, 2015 and 2018 were my 'almost didn't make it' years. After my spiral of reactions, sepsis, and seizures, I waited for my body to 'heal' before I would try the takedown surgery for a second time. I thought, what could possibly happen? In my mind I had been through it all, but I was wrong."

She continued, "I knew deep in my defective gut that I had to be my strongest, and I did everything within reason to get there. It was a good thing I did. I checked into the hospital on April 25, and would be released on June 28, 2018. What I didn't prepare for was that I would be in a medically induced coma for the entire month of May and wake up just days before my 32nd birthday in June."

But she did survive and she thinks it was because "my mind has always been stronger than my body. My mind is what I believe has saved me from death more than once...Code blue, sepsis, TTP, IVC filters, blood clots, bowel preps, platelet paresis treatments, biologics, 6MP, Prednisone, fear, pain, resilience, EMDR therapy, Dilaudid, anxiety, depression, tracheostomies, hallucinations, coma, ECMO, life support, IVIG infusions, hair loss, weight loss, incubation, G-tubes, NG tubes, PTSD – these are just some of the examples of what can happen to someone with ulcerative colitis."

She added that "through every single horrific situation I endured, I knew I kept surviving for a reason. I knew my life had a purpose because I was so close, so many times to not surviving, but God had a purpose for me. My purpose would be my son, Grraison... I knew the moment I was pregnant, this was my purpose the whole time. The reason for my survival. My son was the light at the end of that long IBD tunnel I had been walking through for eight years."

He was also "the reason why I pushed on so hard. There was a drive inside me not knowing where I was going, but I kept on going. One step at a time, I just kept taking steps," Sanford said, and now she will be leading the Take Steps walk to raise money for the Crohn's & Colitis Foundation which is the leading nonprofit organization focused on both research and patient support for inflammatory bowel disease (IBD), with the mission of curing Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis and improving the quality of life for the millions of Americans living with IBD.

According to the foundation, "nearly 1 in 100 Americans suffers from inflammatory bowel disease, which is a group of severe disorders

that cause chronic inflammation of and damage to the gastrointestinal tract. The two most common forms of IBD are Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis, which affect both children and adults. These diseases greatly affect quality of life, causing fatigue, pain, diarrhea, bleeding, nausea, and weight loss,

among other symptoms. Current treatments can help to manage symptoms, but there is no cure

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## How to stay sober on St. Patrick's Day

Sounds fun, right? There are undoubtedly good times had by all who take part, but if you want to stay sober and avoid alcohol, it can pose a challenge. What seems like harmless fun quickly turns into days, months or years of sobriety down the drain.

Suppose someone is in recovery from alcoholism, choosing a healthy lifestyle or recently decided to give up alcohol for whatever reason; the temptation of St. Patrick's Day celebrations is tough to avoid. In any social setting this time of year, there is lively music, good food and lots to drink.

While it is only one day a year, it can quickly derail any progress on sobriety. Fortunately, there are practical approaches you can take to stay sober and reap the benefits of St. Patrick's Day sobriety.

Initially, the best benefit of sobriety on St. Patrick's Day is avoiding impaired driving and not becoming another statistic. In California, alcohol-impaired driving remains one of the biggest threats to public safety. According to a 2021 report, alcohol-involved crashes increased by 16% from 2020 to 2021. If you choose to

celebrate, do not drink and drive and plan ahead.

Staying sober means knowing what to do; consider some pointers.

Remind yourself why you are sober, and don't do it alone. You can still have fun and celebrate but do it with other sober people. Everyone has their reasons why they stopped drinking; remind yourself of those reasons and hold yourself accountable.

Know your triggers. It doesn't matter if you are a recovering addict or have removed alcohol from your life. Be cautious around possible triggers that pose a challenge. Most people in this situation choose to skip the bar and find something fun to do or go to a sober celebration.

Keep a non-alcoholic drink or mocktail in your hand. People will not bother you to ask if you want a drink if you already have something to sip on, like a mocktail. It also leads to planning how to say "no." You will encounter social pressure if you go to a bar on St. Patrick's Day. It's unavoidable. It's wise to practice ways to refuse alcohol.

Finally, if all else fails, take a walk outside if you feel overwhelmed. The most straightforward solutions are usually the best. Remove yourself from any situation you know will lead to relapse. It is also why it's essential to be with a sober friend or loved one; there is accountability and someone to lean on.

### San Diego Seniors Community Foundation awards \$200,000+ to strengthen local senior centers & nonprofits

SAN DIEGO – The San Diego Seniors Community Foundation (SDSCF) awarded \$206,850 in grants and funding allocations to 14 local senior centers and nonprofit organizations to strengthen senior center programming and enhance executive leadership and ensure that a sophisticated network of local senior centers exists to help combat senior isolation.

The allocation of \$206,850 in grant funds supports expanded programming, and services, and even increases hours of operations to serve more seniors. Securing local PR firms to assist in the rebranding and marketing of the valuable programs and services the senior center provides to all older San Diegans.

One of the exciting programs that the Foundation is helping to fund is the Jewish Family Services "Fix It" Program, which provides no-cost minor home modifications to seniors 60 and over. Each year, three million older adults visit emergency rooms due to falls, which impacts their health and can result in costly medical bills. The fix-it program provides minor home repairs and fall prevention installations to reduce the chances of falls and help individuals age in place.

"These grants are truly empowering local senior centers to expand their services and enrich lives," said Kristoffer Kelly, Director of Partnerships of the SDSCF. "We're seeing more seniors access healthy meals, transportation, and social activities that keep them engaged and connected.

'The foundation's mission is to help seniors thrive," added Kelly. "These grants to senior centers in underserved areas are ensuring more equitable access to the programs that support wellbeing and quality of life.'

Presently, San Diego County has 28 senior centers in communities from San Ysidro and Coronado to Oceanside and east to Borrego Springs. However, existing senior centers serve only about 8% of the region's total senior population - and many of these centers are underfunded, understaffed, and lack sufficient programming.

The California Master Plan for Aging and The County of San Diego Aging Roadmap, SDSCF wrote the Master Plan

for Senior Centers for San Diego as a complementary planning document, which presents a vision to modernize the current senior center model and build centers that allow accessibility to seniors. The San Diego County Board of Supervisors supports this plan.

"It's been incredible to see the impact of these grants in aligning with our master plan goals - improved nutrition, decreased isolation, and more diverse programming to promote healthy aging," said Joe Gavin, Chief Program Officer. "By funding things like fitness classes, tech training, and volunteer coordinators, our senior center grants are directly addressing the pillars of our master plan: mental and physical health, lifelong learning, and social connection.

"We are dedicated to ensuring that every senior in San Diego has a place to turn to and trust," said Gavin. "With the creation of the San Diego Senior Center Master Plan, we are taking a bold step towards creating a new sophisticated network of innovative senior centers that will serve as a hub of activity and support for seniors in the community."

About one-quarter (23%) of San Diego seniors age 65+ live alone; an estimated 125,000 senior orphans live in San Diego County. Senior orphans are seniors who have never been married, married but had no kids then became widowed, or they have no family living in the area. The other worstcase scenario is that they have outlived their friends too.

Social isolation is a silent killer and is as harmful as smoking 15 cigarettes a day! The SDSCF is working to ensure every senior has someone they can trust by using the senior center to get them engaged and know they do not have to be alone.

The Sahm Family Foundation supports the SDSCF's effort to enhance and empower senior centers with a commitment of \$2 million over the course of four years. The Sahm Family Foundation believes supporting seniors is an urgent priority as our population ages. Census data predicts that by the year 2030 there will be 1 million people over the age of 60 living in San Diego. This is part of a Seniors Community Foundation.

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## Initiative launched to teach 1 million San Diegans Hands-Only CPR

The County of San Diego is partnering with UC San Diego to launch Revive & Survive San Diego, a new initiative to help save lives.

Revive & Survive San Diego was created to train 1 million San Diegans on how to perform hands-only cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) for people in cardiac arrest.

Hands-only CPR involves chest compressions at 100 to 120 per minute without using mouthto-mouth breathing. If someone can perform this before medical professionals arrive, it vastly increases a person's likelihood of survival.

In recent years, CPR training has shifted to the hand-only approach. Mouth-to-mouth breathing is no longer considered essential.


In 2021, 8% of people who experienced an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest in San Diego County were successfully revived and survived.

'Cardiac arrest continues to be a leading cause of death across the country," said Kristi Koenig, M.D., County of San Diego Emergency Medical Services medical director

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and co-lead of the Revive & Survive San Diego initiative. "No amount of preparedness in a hospital can save a life if the person does not make it into the building. Receiving CPR at the scene will save lives."

Brain death starts to occur four to six minutes after someone experiences cardiac arrest if there is no CPR and defibrillation during that time. For every minute CPR is delayed, survival from cardiac arrest decreases by 7 to 10 percent.

On Feb. 26, leaders from the county, UC San Diego, healthcare and the community participated in a news conference to share more details about the initiative. Emergency doctors from across the region provided hands-on CPR demonstrations and training as part of the event.

Revive & Survive San Diego will work with local healthcare providers and community partner organizations to offer free handsonly CPR training and perform community outreach countywide.

"There is a critical need for community CPR education to help bystanders recognize and

intervene when someone suffers from cardiac arrest," said Cheryl A.M. Anderson, Ph.D., M.P.H., dean, UC San Diego Herbert Wertheim School of Public Health and Human Longevity Science and co-lead of Revive & Survive San Diego.



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

As a former screenwriter, I can attest that studios have paid me large sums of money for stories half as good as this.

Bonsall High, now in its 10th year, is a tiny upstart of a school. It was conceived out of a grassroots effort of dedicated PTA moms who wanted their kids to continue the small community feeling their kids enjoyed at Bonsall Elementary, Bonsall West Elementary, Vivian Banks Charter and Sullivan Middle in high school.

These parents had an uphill battle on their hands, union districts rarely ever made it through the political and legal gauntlet to become a unified school district. But the Bonsall community surprised everyone and found a way to make it happen. Residents in the Bonsall District would have a high school.

And from the beginning the tiny high school, which moved into a newly constructed building on the far edge of the middle school campus, had soccer. Now, BHS didn't have a field, nor proper goals, but they had a dream. The sports program would start with the beautiful game.

Some years there were barely enough players to field a team. Every year the challenge was where would the team play, where would they practice? The team found a home field at the Ingold Sports Park in Fallbrook and they would practice on a half field at the middle school.

Bonsall High's sports program's goal, as recently articulated by the principal, Daniel Smuts, "is to build life skills and provide players an opportunity to develop their talents. At Bonsall, students get a chance to be a part of a team and they get to play. Bigger schools, with bigger pools of talent, really only have opportunities for elite athletes who have dedicated years to that one sport. At Bonsall, there's more room to grow and to take part in more than one sport or activity."

Two years ago, Athletic Director Andrea Breuninger needed a new boys soccer coach for the upcoming season. The high school had swelled to nearly 400 students and there was a group of students who seemed to have a soccer ball permanently attached to their feet at lunch, even dribbling to class during the passing periods.

Unfortunately, coaches seemed to be in shorter supply than a regulation practice field. And with the season approaching, it looked like the school might have to forgo having a team.

A chance conversation with the office manager, Linda Pipe, at Sullivan Middle school revealed that there was a very experienced coach, recently retired from a career in international business in the neighborhood. Mrs. Pipe volunteered her husband to coach. "I think she was eager to find him something to do," quipped Breuninger with a smile.

Enter Ennis Pipe to the Bonsall High School program. Joining the team only days before their first match, Coach Pipe instantly bonded with the team, "They were a great group of guys."

Led by Captain Roman Ibarra-Ponce, the team got off to a rocky start. "The first time that team of players took the field together was at our first game." Due to rain and the delay at finding a coach, they had not had the chance to practice on a full size field before the game.

At the first game last season, they played a pretty seasoned team and they got clobbered. At that game, two rookie, freshman players made a couple mistakes. One player accidentally made an own goal and another did a full "Charlie Brown" missing the ball and falling on his back after sliding

on the wet astroturf.

Unfortunately, the other team's strength was not good sportsmanship. They actually made a video of the mishaps and shared it on the internet, making Bonsall High School Soccer a tiny bit famous for the absolutely worst reason.

"We had a rough start, and if you

only looked at our record, it didn't get much better," said Pipe. "But I met with the guys, and I leveled with them, I asked, guys what do you want to do?"

That team had several seniors, including their captain, Ibarra-Ponce, who was enlisting in the navy right after the season. He spoke for the team when he said, "I want to have fun with my friends. We just want to play." And play they did. Each game, there were more and more highlights, less and less errors, but a win wasn't in the cards.


The last game of the season was a home game at Ingold Field. BHS was 0-16 and facing the same team from the beginning of the season. The same team that had made the viral blooper reel. Teachers and parents lined the field to root The Legion players on and provide support.

The game proved to be the highest scoring of the season, with Bonsall winning by five goals. And in an ending they wouldn't believe in Hollywood, the very same players who had been featured on that viral video both scored their first ever goals! BHS closed the season 1 and 16, but that single victory lit a flame.

This season, the team had more of a running start before the season began. There were 11 returning players as well as some new experienced talent. The team also had for the second year, Coach Pipe.

Coach Pipe started playing soccer at 12 years old when soccer was still looked upon as that "foreign" sport by most Americans. His parents were both from England and the family relocated there while Ennis was still in school. He played in Suffolk with kids who had lived and breathed the sport their whole lives

By the time Pipe moved back stateside, he had become quite a player himself, playing for his college team at Foothill College and eventually playing in the semi-professional league in the Bay Area.

Pipe began his coaching career at age 21, coaching soccer at the high school level while playing in college. He coached at the club level in Cedar Rapids while also playing for an adult club team. By the time Coach Ennis and his wife Linda had moved to Bonsall, he had coached for 25 years. Believing that he had hung up his cleats for good, Coach Pipe started substitute teaching, "I've always enjoyed working with kids."

That was until that fateful day, when Breuninger asked, "Anyone know where I could find a soccer coach?"

Coach Pipe gave the team four objectives: 1) be part of the high school experience (belonging) and embrace being a student athlete, 2) have fun and develop your skills, 3) build confidence and life skills to prepare you for life and 4) develop character and backbone.

This season, despite losing their star goalie, the team roared back to life, closing the season undefeated

in regular league play. Led by team co-captains Drake Carterette, Thomas Sanchez, and Jesus Jaime, five players scored their first ever goals of their high school career. Not only did the team rack up the most wins in school history, but they also advanced to the second round of the CIF playoffs which is a record achievement for the team.

Of the team, the coach had nothing but respect for his guys, mentioning, "That Drake is a great leader, that sets up the entire team with no ego." Of first year team member, Thomas Sanchez, the coach said, "Thomas does things with the ball that I've never seen anyone do." And of Jesus Jaime, who had to step in as goalie, "It shows great character to step into a position that is new and do it for the team."

The only question on anyone's mind who saw the closing game at Ingold Field was, "I wonder how far they'll go next year?"

## Brockson, Huntington each win twice at CIF masters tournament

Fallbrook High School seniors Nic Brockson and Devin Huntington each won two matches at the all-division CIF San Diego Section masters tournament Feb. 16-17 at Southwest High School in El Centro.

Brockson wrestled in the 126-pound division at the double-elimination tournament. Huntington was in the 150-pound bracket. Fallbrook freshman Ricky Lopez was in the 108-pound division, although he lost both of his matches.

"Bringing three guys to masters is really big," said Fallbrook coach Tom Brockson.

CIF competition divisions for wrestling are by school enrollment. Fallbrook's boys were in Division II this year. The Division II tournament was held Feb. 10 at Orange Glen High School. The top six Division II wrestlers in each weight class qualified for the masters tournament.

Nic Brockson placed second in the Division II tournament. He began masters competition with a first-round bye and then pinned Payton Mixon of Guajome Park Academy 29 seconds into their match. Brawley's Diego Arias, who eventually placed fourth, pinned Brockson at the end of the second period of their quarterfinal.

Brockson began his consolation matches with a 15-2 major decision victory over Oceanside's Isaiah Rosales. The win gave Brockson a match against Carlsbad's Connor O'Balle with the winner being guaranteed a place among the

O'Balle pinned Nic Brockson 1:39 into the match. "He got

caught in a weird scramble," Tom Brockson said.

Last year, Nic Brockson was fourth in the 115-pound bracket at the masters tournament, which qualified him for the state tournament although he lost both of his matches there.

Huntington did not qualify for last year's masters tournament. This year, third place at the divisional tournament allowed him to conclude his high school career at the masters.

"Devin's developed really quickly, and he got to a good level really fast," Tom Brockson said.

The first masters match for Huntington was a 9-1 major decision victory over Madison's Cyrus Moliere. Allowing one point for an escape wasn't the only adverse element of the match for Huntington. "He hurt his knee," Brockson said. "He kept wrestling all day through it."

Whether a healthy Huntington could have defeated Poway's Laird Root in the second round can be questioned, but Root eventually placed third and might have finished first had he not tried to turn Ramona's Liam Gonzalez in the semifinals and accidentally stepped on his counterpart.

If a wrestler withdraws for medical reasons, it is normally a forfeit, but if that injury is due to an opponent's penalty he or she wins by forfeit. Gonzalez had pain on his left side including his shoulder and his ribs, so he was given the forfeit win over Root.

"Laird's a solid wrestler," Brockson said.

Only one of Root's matches in the masters tournament lasted

longer than a minute. That was when he pinned Huntington 1:39 into the first period. "He actually frustrated Laird," Brockson said.

In the consolation bracket, Huntington pinned Caleb Wright of San Pasqual 42 seconds into the second period. Nolan White of Coastal Academy then eliminated Huntington with a 2-1 decision victory.

"He really stuck with the match. He lost, but he didn't get blown away," Brockson said.

Lopez placed sixth at the Division II tournament. In the masters tournament, he was pinned by Christian's Ryland Valdez at the end of the first period and pinned by Ayers Reich of Cathedral Catholic with 10 seconds remaining in the second period.

"He got the experience," Brockson said.

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


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

## Board seeks ways to expand opportunities for local wineries

The county is moving forward with a plan to allow wine operations in the unincorporated area opportunities to expand.

There are currently four types of wineries allowed in agricultural zones governed by the county's Tiered Winery Ordinance.

The streamlined plan considers the wine industry market, zoning and geographic characteristics to find the right lands for wineries.

The board chose from three options on how to move forward. The chosen option offers the fastest way to expand wineries in certain areas, potentially adding between 33,000 to 62,000 wine-friendly acres to the unincorporated area.

Any official zoning changes for wineries in the unincorporated area will take more than a year. County staff will need to finish a program and conduct further research that will cost about \$700,000.

The county will develop the new winery ordinance with help from the local wine industry and community members. The goal is to create a path for wineries to expand operations under a streamlined permitting process.

Wineries wishing to expand will still have to prepare site plans and environmental documents for their projects.

The county will also determine how to allow amplified music at all types of existing wineries as part of an upcoming routine

Additional Board of Supervisor hearings will be needed to consider a final program and amend the actual ordinance to support proposed changes.

### Tragic loss, amazing beauty makes lemonade on March 9 at Live Oak Park

FALLBROOK - The loss of a 200 year old oak tree near Live Oak Park's Dog Park is truly sad for tree lovers. But residents also marvel at the beauty of the pear trees at Vince Ross Village Square. Jackie Heyneman of the Save Our Forest (SOF/FLC) committee commented that it is amazing how things happen relative to each other in some way, "Making lemonade out of lemons is an old adage, but could be used here."

With California Arbor week coming soon, from March 7 to March 14, an old friend of SOF, Roger Boddaert offered to help the group celebrate on March 9 at 10 a.m. by planting trees at Live Oak Park.

He contacted LOP Rangers and Jake Enriguez of the San Diego County Parks and Recreation Department for the Fifth Supervisory District mid-February. They were all on board to provide support for a community tree planting, a real Tree Festival.

Ironically, the old live oak tree fell on Feb. 23. This was reminiscent of the 1992/93 winter when 17 tees fell on Live Oak Park Road in one night temporarily closing the road. That was such a huge catastrophe that residents on the road responded, organized and solicited the community to help and plant 165 oak trees on Live Oak Park Road, Reche Road and in Live Oak Park itself. It was organized by the SOF precursor, naming themselves Save the Oaks.

Why does this happen? Live oaks have adapted to living in Southern California's coastal

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

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## Tips for pruning and feeding rose bushes

Depending on your location - or more specifically, that of your garden - you may have experienced frost damage to your roses and tender young plants. The thing is, even gardens in the same general vicinity may have different effects due to their prevailing micro-climates. According to AccuWeather, for the first half of March the coldest nighttime temp will be 36 degrees Monday, March 4. The average date for the

last frost date is Friday, March 15. Overall, temperatures predicted for March are near average and rain is likely. Roses enjoy this weather - it encourages them to jump into life.

### After pruning

First, make sure the garden is free of left-over debris and dispose of it in the green garden waste bin - do not compost rose debris in your yard. Backyard composting doesn't get hot enough to kill any pathogens. Second, if you didn't do it already for pruning, remove

much pruning you had to do, your pruners may need to be sharpened. Take time now to inspect and make any necessary repairs to your irrigation system while there is little new foliage. Then you'll be prepared to begin a regular irrigation schedule. Drip systems

keep down disease. Depending on

how many roses you have and how

are the most efficient and they avoid problems created by aboveground sprayers and sprinklers, which waste water and can foster mold, mildew and rust. If possible, avoid any over-spray or misting applied elsewhere in your garden that may hit your roses; but if you use overhead watering systems, avoid doing so when there is any wind to avoid moisture evaporating or collecting on leaves which could result in sunburn or add to conditions favorable for fungal diseases. For best results and efficiency, schedule irrigation so it is complete before the day gets hot – preferably by mid-morning, that is, 8-9 a.m. Avoid afternoon or evening watering to prevent excess ground moisture into night time. Too wet soil can lead to unhappy roots and/or fungal diseases.

### Clean and sharpen pruners

Sharp pruners make for clean cuts and the prevention of diseases or otherwise damaged weak canes. The best files to use are thin flat types with diamond grit material. This type allows easier sharpening for the tight spaces between the cutting blade and bar. Attempt to follow the current/original bevel/ angle of the sharp blade. Felco said that the angle for their pruners is 23 degrees. Keeping pruners clean can be done using >70% isopropyl

heavy deposits of plant "juice" will help remove it. Lubricate the mechanism with a light oil like 3-in-One.

### **Spraying**

If your roses experienced fungal diseases last year and you haven't yet done so, you might think of applying a copper dormant spray soon - but only if you can be fairly certain it won't rain for 24 hours. You can mix Horticultural Oil with the dormant spray for better adherence - but read the label to make sure you can mix different sprays. These will reduce the likelihood of early fungal and pest issues. Oh, and as a note of caution: Be prepared for chilli thrips as temperatures warm up.

First read the spray label completely to ensure the proper strength of the mixture for "growing season instructions" as the new growth has begun. Second, saturate all canes and the soil surface of the entire bed. Third, maintain a minimum of 2 inches to 4 inches of organic composted mulch over the entire garden surface to insulate the upper 8 inches to 12 inches of the soil zone where most rose roots feed, and to reduce evaporation and conserve water, while still providing sufficient moisture. It will also supply nutrients to build the soil for your roses over the

### **Feeding**

Roses do love food and water for the best blooms. Rule of thumb: When new growth is 2-3 inches long it is time to begin a fertilizing program. I suggest an initial feeding be higher in nitrogen

(N) to encourage new stem and leaf growth. In about two weeks, apply fertilizer that is higher in phosphate (P) and potassium (K) to give roots a boost at that start of season. New information suggests that continued use of fertilizer higher in P and K will foster greater root development and lead to better growth, disease resistance and healthier plants. Look for fertilizers rated as 8-10-8 that include micro elements for greater results. Also, you can apply worm castings; available at garden stores and nurseries.

I highly recommend organic type fertilizers vs. inorganic or "chemical" ones. Organics foster better soil development, a richer, livelier, more viable community of soil organisms that break the elements into easily absorbed form and release them slowly. They will "build" soil structure into a healthy component and when used regularly will develop a soil rich in reserve energy, allowing you to use less product with the same results.

There will be an American Rose Society Pacific Southwest District Rose Show and Convention, April 26-28, at Los Angeles Arboretum, in Arcadia, sponsored by the Pacific Rose Society. It's a beautiful venue with lots of interesting trees and shrubs, as well as noisy peacocks.

Also the San Diego Rose Society will sponsor a rose show May 4-5. As in past years it will be at the Ronald Reagan Center, 195 E. Douglas Avenue in El Cajon. Make plans to attend.

Be sure to visit the Rose Haven Heritage Garden located at 30500 Jedediah Smith Road in Temecula, a 3.4-acre rose garden owned and maintained by the Temecula Valley Rose Society, a 501(c)(3) organization, supported with donations from kind people like you. 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## County expands tree planting program in unincorporated communities

County Board of Supervisors voted at the end of February to expand its robust tree planting program in underserved communities in the unincorporated

The board's actions allow the county to award contracts estimated at \$2 million to buy about 4,000 trees through different vendors. In addition to buying trees, the funds will be used to remove dead or diseased trees, install watering systems and the necessary equipment. The trees will be planted between spring and winter this year.

On Aug. 31, 2022, the board approved the development of an Equity-Driven Tree Planting Program. The program focuses on identifying priority locations for tree planting in underserved areas.

The county surpassed its goal of

planting 10,000 trees in the 2023 calendar year, adding 11,010 to parks and facilities across the region, including:

- 5,744 new trees planted at county parks and facilities
- 1,637 trees planted through non-government organizational partnerships
- 3,629 trees planted by incorporated cities

Since 2016, the county has planted over 35,000 trees in county parks to help reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Plants and trees extract the greenhouse gas carbon dioxide from the air and use it to grow through photosynthesis. Several large volunteer events contributed to the county tree plantings. They included:

- Hundreds of students from St. Augustine High School planted trees at county parks during "Giving Tuesday."
- Staff at 14 county parks hosted planting events during "Green

Friday," an annual stewardship.

- The county delivered 2,000 Coast Live Oaks to a storage area at Mt. Woodson where they are being staged for planting.
- The Sheriff's Department's Reentry Services Community Involved Vocational Incarcerated Crew Services Program has planted over 2,500 oak trees at county parks in the past five years.

The county's Parks and Recreation Tree Planting Program is part of the county's Climate Action Plan. The overall goal of the plan is to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

The county plants a variety of healthy native and climateready trees that adapt to changing temperatures. These types of trees also help to prevent tree infestation by pests. More trees help clean the air, provide shade, and cool air temperatures in the surrounding environment.

The U.S. Forest Service

estimates that California has lost more than 147 million trees since 2010. The county estimated 20 trees per acre were lost over 50,000 acres of county open space.

### Millions of Californians to get average of \$146 in credits on their April utility bills

SACRAMENTO - Today. Governor Gavin Newsom announced millions of Californians will receive an average of \$146 in credits on their April gas and electric bills. The California Climate Credit – automatically applied to Californians' bills every April and October - is a direct result of the state's nation-leading Cap-and-Trade climate program that requires polluters to pay for climate action.

Since 2014, California households have already received an average of \$971 in combined automatic April and October climate credits on their utility bills, totaling more than \$14 billion statewide.

"Every year, California's nationleading climate laws deliver real climate action while giving you money back on your utility bills. This relief will support millions of California families," said

California will provide a total of \$2.7 billion in credits – \$1.6 billion for electric customers, \$1 billion for natural gas customers, and \$160 million for small businesses.

The credits range from \$32 to \$175 for electricity bills with most set to receive \$55 to \$86 – and approximately \$58 to \$86 on natural gas bills for residential customers of PG&E, Southern California Edison, San Diego Gas & Electric, Southern California Gas Company, Bear Valley, Liberty, PacifiCorp, and Southwest Gas. Californians can check how much their credit will be here, <a href="https://www.cpuc.ca.gov/">https://www.cpuc.ca.gov/</a> climatecredit.

Californians do not need to do anything to get the credit. The California Climate Credit comes from the State's Capand-Trade Program managed by the California Air Resources Board. The credit on utility bills represents the consumer's share of the payments from the State's program.

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

## Man who tortured and killed 10 cats sentenced to 8 years in state prison

San Diego Humane Society's Humane Law Enforcement investigated gruesome case in Escondido

ESCONDIDO – A man who pled guilty to torturing and killing at least 10 cats in Escondido was sentenced in North County Superior Court on Friday, March 1. Joshua Tyler Boyer, the defendant, was sentenced to 8 years in state prison after pleading guilty to 10 felony counts of crimes against animals.

After hearing victim impact statements in a packed courtroom, Judge Robert J. Kearney denied the defendant's request for probation and cited Boyer's sadistic nature and pronounced him a serious danger to society before delivering the sentence.

San Diego Humane Society's Humane Law Enforcement opened an investigation into Boyer on May 24, 2019, after a GPS tracker on a cat named Leonard, who was reported missing, led to the discovery of 10 deceased animals, and other partial remains, on his property.

Humane officers seized more than 125 pieces of evidence, including firearms and tools used to inflict harm, that linked Boyer's finger prints and DNA to the feline victims. One of the victims had a microchip that came back to San Diego Humane Society, further linking Boyer to the case.

This case included collaboration between multiple law enforcement agencies, including Escondido Police, San Diego County Sheriff's Department and the FBI.


"While we can never erase the suffering endured by these helpless animals, we take solace in this investigation coming to a conclusion with the judge sentencing Boyer to 8 years in state prison," said San Diego Humane Society Humane Law Enforcement Lt. Regina Price. "We want this case to serve as a stark reminder that we will relentlessly pursue justice for those who cannot speak for themselves.'

During the investigation, Humane officers discovered Boyer was using social media under false pretenses to obtain some of his victims. Boyer also adopted two cats from San Diego Humane Society. Interviews with people who rehomed their cat to Boyer through Craigslist revealed that Boyer would claim to be a military

veteran to gain trust of pet owners looking to find new homes for their cats.

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## Board of Supervisors unanimously approves American Rescue Plan Act Spending Plan

The County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously today on how to spend the final \$102 million of American Rescue Plan Act funds.

In 2021, the county got \$650 million in ARPA funds from the federal government and adopted a framework for spending it. ARPA is a stimulus bill meant to help the country recover from the COVID-19 pandemic and its economic and social impacts.

The projected remaining \$102 million in ARPA funds is broken down into two categories: \$67 million in ARPA framework funds and \$35 million dedicated for "evergreen" programs.

The Board approved the following breakdown of ARPA Framework funds:

- \$15 million for the Regional Homeless Assistance program to support people in the unincorporated area.
- \$10 million for COVID-related costs.
- \$4.3 million to complete pilot programs like the Family Income for Empowerment Program which gives families with children under 18 years old \$500 a month for 24 months.

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OUTLOOK

- \$27.1 million to continue running ARPA programs for things like homeless assistance, housing and behavioral health services.
- And \$10 million which will be set aside in case FEMA does not reimburse the County for pandemic-era hotel rooms for vulnerable populations.
- For the "evergreen" component, which is for programs that have a lasting benefit in our

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region, including in behavioral health, housing, climate change, economic prosperity, homelessness and workforce, the board voted to spend:


\$15 million for the implementation of Senate Bill 43 (Involuntary Behavioral Health Treatment) including Public Conservator infrastructure, crisis stabilization capacity and overall substance use disorder treatment services capacity.

- \$10.6 million for the Innovative Housing Trust Fund to create more affordable housing.
- \$10 million to expand San Diego County's behavioral health workforce including recruitment, retention and workforce development.
- Up to \$10 million for

natural disaster prevention and preparedness pending reimbursement from FEMA of funds spent for the January storm relief.

In the coming months, staff will present to the board more detailed recommendations on today's approved ARPA spending.

The county has until December 2026 to fully spend ARPA money.
