

New county budget takes on region's challenges

County government works hard to keep its three million residents healthy, safe and thriving. But like many regions this size, there are challenges. The County of San Diego's new recommended budget stands ready to meet these challenges head on.

The recommended budget will increase \$469.5 million next fiscal year for a total of \$6.26 billion, an 8.1 percent increase over the current year.

The new plan focuses on critical needs in the community: homelessness, substance abuse and mental health issues.

Funding will also help break barriers to success for those leaving the criminal justice system, address the affordable housing crisis, add to the quality of life in neighborhoods and protect natural resources. On top of that, the budget retains or improves current levels of service to the county's residents.

More than \$175 million and 120 new jobs will be dedicated to meeting the needs of our most vulnerable residents, including those at risk or experiencing homelessness. A record high of

Burn Institute recognizes heroes from the Lilac fire

SAN DIEGO - The Burn Institute recognized 12 outstanding individuals May 9, that have selflessly made a difference in the lives of others as they celebrated local heroes at the annual Spirit of Courage Awards Banquet.

For over four decades, the Burn Institute has paid tribute to members of the community who have risked their lives in an effort to save another from burn injury or death by fire. They have presented the prestigious Spirit of Courage Award to over 700 local heroes, including civilians, fire service and law enforcement professionals.

"The definition of a hero is a person who is admired or idealized for courage, outstanding achievements, or noble qualities" said executive director Susan Day, "these 12 honorees easily meet all of those qualifications".

Recipients of the Spirit of Courage Awards included five people involved in Lilac fire rescues on Dec. 7, 2017.

The first incident involved California Highway Patrol Officer David Moyer and Fallbrook resident Amber McPolin. As the Lilac fire began, Moyer was assigned to road patrol at the intersection of Camino Del Rey and SR-76, when McPolin came running up to him frantically. She had just gotten off the phone with her father, who was trapped with her grandfather atop the burning hill behind them.

She told Moyer that a 911 operator advised her that firefighters could not locate their home and that she knew exactly how to get there. After asking other officers to let her up the closed road and getting denied, she was grateful to have found Moyer who immediately told her to get in his patrol car. Moyer expeditiously made his way through the burning neighborhood, driving through thick smoke and flames coming from both sides of the road.

As they arrived at the home, they came to a large metal gate that was locked. Moyer gave McPolin his gas mask and they ran outside together to find a way to open the gate. She began typing in the key code, but the gate was nonoperational. The fire department, which was at the driveway

working on extinguishing the fire surrounding them, broke down the gate.

The private driveway was filled with thick smoke, making for zero visibility ahead. McPolin grabbed Moyer's hand and instructed him that she knew the way. As they began running up the drive, a Sheriff's deputy drove up in a patrol car and they hopped inside to make their way towards the home. Upon reaching the residence, they located her's father and grandfather, who were using garden hoses in an attempt to extinguish the oncoming fire. Moyer directed McPolin and her family to leave the property immediately. Together, they rushed down the burning hill to safety.

The second incident involved three individuals at the San Luis Rey Training Center. On Dec. 7, 2017, Joe Herrick and Martine and Pierre Bellocq were going about their normal routine, caring for their beloved horses at the training center, when everything changed in an instant. The Lilac fire began roughly six miles from the center

and charred everything in its path. As Herrick was leaving the facility, he noticed smoke off in the distance and fire engines heading their way. Immediately, he called the training center to warn them of the impending fire and turned around to get back to the stables, honking the entire way in an effort to alert the homes around them. Upon arrival, he and others at the track began soaking the barns with a hose, as the winds raged and embers flew overhead.

Suddenly, an ember ignited a tall palm tree and within seconds the palm was fully engulfed, dropping flaming pieces around them. Fiery palm fronds were falling and the

NCFPD approves fire engine purchase

The North County Fire Protection District will be acquiring two new fire engines.

An April 24 NCFPD board vote approved the purchase of two Type One fire engines from Pierce Manufacturing and authorized NCFPD staff to execute the purchase agreement.

"It's the first major purchase of fire engines for a number of years," said NCFPD fire chief Steve Abbott. "We kind of had to hold our breath during the Great Recession."

The district currently has five active and two reserve structural fire engines. In March 2016 the NCFPD board approved a capital equipment replacement program which covered anticipated purchases over a 15-year period; that vote also directed NCFPD staff to fund the capital equipment replacement schedule utilizing general fund revenue.

The schedule sets the service life of wildland fire engines and staff vehicles at 15 years and designates the service life of structural fire engines as 15 years with an additional five years of service as a reserve vehicle. The plan called for \$1,434,049 to be

On Tuesday, May 22, at 6 p.m., residents will hear how the "Blue Zones" can help improve wellbeing for all individuals.

On Wednesday, May 23, residents are invited to a daylong program beginning at 9:30 a.m. with a community transformation presentation learning about how the Blue Zones Project transforms communities and measures results, focus groups with residents from community policy, worksites, faith-based and school perspectives, and finally concluding with a Wine @ 5 casual reception.



Animals need our advocacy too

Most of us love animals and want to see that they are treated humanely. That's why I'm supporting several bills this session that will help ensure the safety and well-being of pets and

It often falls to first responders to provide life-saving first aid to animals during emergency situations. This is not infrequent, as thousands of pets are rescued by firefighters and other first responders each year. Senate Bill 1305, introduced by Senator Steve Glazer (D-Orinda), would ensure that first responders and their employees cannot be held liable for civil damages or criminal prosecution if they provide preveterinary emergency care to an injured dog or cat at the scene of an emergency.

Another bill, AB 2791, by Assemblymember Al Muratsuchi (D-Torrance), speeds the adoption of impounded kittens and puppies which are currently subject to a three-day hold requirement. The animals would be made immediately available to nonprofit rescue groups, relieving shelters from the need to use their limited space and resources to hold and care for them.

Our love of animals does not just include the four legged variety. SB 1017, authored by Senator Ben Allen (D-Santa Monica), would limit the use of mile-long drift gillnets intended for swordfish and thresher sharks. Unfortunately, other species including whales, dolphins and sea lions are often trapped in them. Much of this unintended catch, 20 percent of which is already dead, is thrown back. Since new fishing techniques have been developed that limit unintended catch, it's time California joined Washington and Oregon in outlawing the use of large mesh drift gillnets.

I am proud to join outstanding local groups like the San Diego Humane Society in support of these important measures. To follow these bills' progress, please visit http://www.leginfo. <u>legislature.ca.gov</u>.

spent in fiscal year 2018-19 to cover \$691,551 for a structural fire engine, \$392,508 for a wildland fire engine, and \$350,000 for electrocardiograms. The plan also calls for the replacement of structural engines in 2021-22, 2023, 24, and 2027, 28

2023-24, and 2027-28.

The structural engine to be replaced during 2018-19 is a 2003 Pierce. However, one of the reserve engines is 30 years old and no longer meets current National Fire Protection Association standards while the other reserve engine is 21 years old. The board agreed to place the 2006 engine in reserve and take delivery of that vehicle's replacement two years early so that both reserve engines could be taken out of service.

The replacement of the older engines not only allows the fire department to meet current standards but also provides a fleet of Pierce engines. "These models are going to mirror other apparatus that we already have, which will keep our fleet uniform," Abbott said. "This will allow our reserve

engines to be able to replace our front line apparatus with the same capability."

Pierce has a service center in Ontario. "It's kind of a rare thing to have a service center so close," Abbott said. "It really helps us with the turnaround on repairs that we can't handle locally."

The North County Fire Protection District had previously approved Pierce as the sole source for fire engines, but the district uses the HGACBuy government procurement services and the engine purchases are competitively bid. South Coast Fire Equipment, Inc., whose office is also in Ontario, will supply the new fire engines.

Each engine will cost \$731,328.56 including sales tax and fees, so the cost for the two engines is \$1,462,657.12. The purchase agreement also includes a 15-year loan with an interest rate of approximately four percent, so the annual payment for both engines will be approximately \$130,000.

South Coast Fire Equipment, Inc., expects to deliver the fire engines to the North County Fire Protection District in early 2019.





more than \$650 million will go toward behavioral health services.

That means funding for individualized drug and alcohol treatment programs will triple. The county will put \$1 million into domestic violence response teams and mobile family trauma services. Funding continues for Project One for All, a program that has housed and treated more than 600 homeless people with severe mental illness.

The budget will fund 50 Psychiatric Emergency Response Teams and the county's Whole Person Wellness program which aims to help 1,000 homeless Medi-Cal patients who cycle in and out of emergency rooms.

The county will continue providing public health, behavioral health and self-sufficiency services at the City of San Diego's three tent shelters. The budget also calls for 12 additional public health nurses to address public health priorities.

Every year, 80,000 adults are booked into the county jails, and on any given day about a third of the population in custody receives mental health care. The budget will add mental health clinicians and discharge planners to the jails so those leaving the system have a better chance to succeed in the

Probation will see nearly \$3 million for additional re-entry services. The department will issue transit passes to probationers so they can get to work or locations with needed services. Eight new staff positions will help the Public Defender's Office clear convictions for human trafficking victims involved with separate offenses and help clients struggling with

The budget also provides an additional \$7.6 million dollars for an array of wraparound and other services for youth. Those services include mentoring, family therapy and help finding work. More kids in the juvenile justice system will get a chance to join the Alternatives to Detention program.

To address the affordable housing crisis, the county will use the \$25 million Innovative Housing Trust Fund approved last year as well as surplus county property to develop homes for seniors, veterans and other vulnerable people. This is expected to create 400 to 600 new affordable housing units for lowincome residents or people with special needs.

The plan sets aside funds to begin updating 15 community plans in the unincorporated area to expand housing options for residents of all income levels. The county will also cut costs and permit processing times to boost housing stock for middle-income households.

The county is investing in infrastructure too. A new Live Well Center will serve communities in southeastern San Diego. The current Health Services complex at Rosecrans and Pacific Highway will transform into a County Live Well Campus, complete with an assessment center and transitional housing. Both locations will offer a one-stop location for public assistance and veteran benefits, health, behavioral health and employment services. The Kearny Mesa Juvenile Detention Facility will be redeveloped into a Juvenile Justice Campus.

In the unincorporated area, residents will see new libraries, additional sidewalks and repairs to 180 miles of roads. New or improved fire stations will guard against the ongoing threat of wildfires in the backcountry, and more parks and trails will give all residents more opportunities to enjoy the outdoors. Another 500 acres of open space will help preserve the region's natural beauty.

The county's balanced budget is designed to spend taxpayer dollars wisely, as well as maintain prudent reserves and its AAA credit rating. Public hearings will begin on June 11 with the first two days dedicated to the Community Enhancement Program. Hearings to receive testimony on the budget will begin at 9 a.m. on June 13. Budget deliberations and adoption are set for 2 p.m. on June 26.

structures began to burn. With horse stalls filled to the brim with straw, the barns burned in seconds. Herrick and the Bellocq's rushed into burning stalls filled with thick black smoke and flames in an effort to release the horses.

Herrick was able to set one horse free, but both of them suffered burn injuries and he was forced to retreat. Martine attempted numerous times to save her horses, but they were frightened and in a panic. Through all of the chaos, horses that had been released were running rampant throughout the grounds, crashing into one another and stampeding.

Martine tried one last time and was met with a wall of fire, causing burn injuries to 60 percent of her crying out the names of her horses, Pierre came to her rescue, carrying her away from the barns and to fire service personnel who provided medical treatment. The fire ultimately burned 4,100 acres and took the lives of 46 horses.

The Spirit of Courage Awards Banquet was held at the Paradise Point Resort and Spa in San Diego and nearly 300 guests attended, including a heavy presence from fire service and law enforcement agencies. Local NBC 7 newscaster Bridget Naso emceed for the evening's festivities.

San Diego City Fire Fighters Local 145 was the host sponsor of the event. Other sponsors included San Diego Gas & Electric, Dr. Seuss Foundation, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 569, On-Site Tech Support and Fire Etc.

Relieve stress while helping butterflies

The Fallbrook Regional Health District-sponsored Woman of Wellness program May 3 featured Pam Meisner (aka Ms. Smarty Plants) from The Water Conservation Garden in El Cajon. Held at Fallbrook Library, the theme was "Butterfly Gardening is Good for the Heart".

After a quick explanation of the Blue Zone Project® by FRHD's Wendy Lyon, a good-size crowd of ladies and three men enjoyed learning about butterflies and the health benefits of gardening.

According to Meisner, working outside is calming whether one has one plant on a patio or a whole garden. Gardening helps relieve stress, she said. She also thinks that kids now miss out on outside experiences. In a 24-hour day, she said, they sleep seven to 12 hours, watch a screen for over nine hours (computer, television, etc.) and are outside for only half an hour. She said, "Ms. Smarty Plants is going to change that."

Aknowledgeable and enthusiastic speaker, she talked about some important visitors to any garden. Meisner said that butterflies are one of three huge pollinators, along with bees and bats. (Many

plants like cacti bloom at night so are pollinated by bats which are nocturnal.)

"We are losing bees and butterflies," she added. It takes five generations of butterflies to migrate from Canada to Mexico. The number that makes it has declined 90 percent she said, but no one knows why they migrate to

The reasons for the decline, Meisner explained, include human beings and climate change, a lack of food supply, pesticides and their changing environment. Milkweed is the only plant that monarch butterflies will lay their eggs on; there are 16 varieties of milkweed across the United States.

There are two kinds of plants that butterflies prefer; the first is the host plant where they lay their eggs. Once the caterpillars hatch, they eat all the leaves on that plant. The second is the plant from which the butterflies eat nectar.

To encourage the butterfly population's survival, Meisner advises people to plant at least three milkweed plants at a time. She handed out packets of milkweed seeds to everyone who wanted them

She said the life cycle of a butterfly is two to three weeks. When a caterpillar spins its

chrysalis, she explained, it looks like a dead leaf so it is camouflaged from its predators, usually hidden underneath something. The butterfly emerges from the chrysalis when the weather is warm. She took an empty chrysalis around the room so everyone could see it up close.

She also showed a glass version of a monarch chrysalis which is green with a little gold crown on top (hence its name). The chrysalis turns dark before the butterfly emerges with damp wings. With its first breath, its tongue uncurls in two long pieces which join together as a straw with which it drinks nectar, Meisner said.

Most host plants are drought tolerant; many of them are weeds. The tiger swallowtail likes lemon trees. She took a real swallowtail around the audience, giving everyone butterfly kisses.

More facts about butterflies – they taste with their feet, the color of their wings is made up of individual scales and you can tell the difference between male and female monarch butterflies. The males have two spots on their lower wings.

Also, the difference between a moth and a butterfly is that a moth closes its wings down and a butterfly closes its wings up.

Caterpillars take five stages of

gorging, busting their skin each time then continuing to eat, eat, eat. Then they crawl up high to hang upside down and spin a chrysalis around them. Butterfly caterpillars are colorful whereas moth caterpillars are furry.

Another little-known fact is that butterflies don't pee or poop, Meisner said; they "mist". They spend 10 days in the chrysalis and if the temperature is too cold, they will stay there for up to two months longer, until the air is warm. Butterflies are only seen in warm weather.

To protect butterflies, Meisner advised not using pesticides as the poison is systemic, absorbed throughout the whole plant. She said San Diego has the worst soil in the world. "You don't want to bring amendments on top of the soil, they need to be mixed in, 2/3 soil to 1/3 amendment," she said.

She also recommended using organic material for mulch – leaves, bark chips, rock, shredded bark – which will save 40 percent of one's water bill. Most of a home's water use is outside in the yard.

Using mulch helps stop weeds from growing and keeps water in the soil instead of evaporating. Mulch can be used with potted plants too with three to four inches on top of the soil. Plants also need

the right kind of irrigation Meisner said, meaning it waters the base of the plant, directly into the soil.

With sprinklers, on the other hand, less than 10 percent of the water gets to the roots of the plant; the rest is blown away or evaporates. When watering a tree, it is not good to water the trunk. To reach the roots, the water needs to be directed at the drip line of the leaves. Circular irrigation waters all around the tree away from the trunk.

The biggest problem is overwatering, she said; "You need to put your finger in the dirt to tell if it needs watering, not just guess."

Meisner said gardening gives her pleasure which has made a real difference in her life. Even though she has had MS (multiple sclerosis) for 32 years, she thinks gardening is why "I am still going; I have taken the time to de-stress my life."

So, she advised everyone to find that something for themselves, "maybe you like to knit, bake, grandkids – there is something out there for each and everyone of you to de-stress. Take the time to smell the roses. Whatever it is, give yourself three minutes a day to pick a flower, smell a flower, eat chocolate..."

What are some parenting goals?

Being a parent is certainly an experience in extremes. There are times when it can be so fulfilling and rewarding for what has been accomplished as a parent, yet plenty of other times when the best a parent can feel is stressed and frustrated.

Nearly every parent will admit to sometimes feeling over their heads in a job for which no one has trained them, but most people still find that being a parent is wonderful and challenging. And, when they approach parenting in a positive way, it's possible to increase the wonderful aspects while reducing the stress of the job.

One way to do that is to bring a bit of the business world into their work as a parent. A good businessman almost always starts with a business plan, setting goals and outlining how those goals will be reached. Parents can do a similar thing to help bring more consistency to their parenting, rather than simply reacting to situations or disciplining haphazardly.

They could start by writing down reasonable, positive goals in regard to what they'd like to achieve with their child. These goals can be as broad as wanting to support the child by expressing love and acceptance. They might

include not wanting to withdraw affection simply because they're

angry with their child.

The next step is to figure out how to reach those goals. If it's a broad goal, add specifics to it. If the goal is to be consistent in regard to discipline, the parent could think about how they can work together with their child to set limits and boundaries and develop reasonable penalties when those limits are ignored. If a goal is to more consistently demonstrate love and support, consider ways to make that abstract goal a real world happening.

The last step is to put these goals into practice. Realize that it may take time and repeated tries to achieve these goals. You may find some are unattainable and need to be revised. Parenting is always going to be a dynamic experience that requires time, patience and practice.

Parents should allow the child, and themselves, to make mistakes as they try to work toward the goals and they should reward both the child and themselves when they succeed. When a businessman has a solid business plan, success comes in reach. That's what parents want to shoot for in setting goals as a parent.

Every year, more than 1,000 college students are lost to suicide across the country.

To shed light on this troubling statistic, over 1,000 backpacks will be on display at San Diego City College as part of "Send Silence Packing," a traveling exhibit representing the number of college students who end their lives.

The San Diego County Health and Human Services Agency's Behavioral Health Services funded the exhibit, which will be on display at three local colleges and universities.

Send Silence Packing took place Wednesday, May 9, at San Diego City College's Curran Plaza. The exhibit will travel to Palomar College, where it will be on display, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Thursday, May 17. Palomar

College is located at 1140 W. Mission Road, in San Marcos. It first arrived at California State University San Marcos, April 30.

Send Silence Packing was designed to raise awareness about the incidence and impact of suicide among college students and connect them to needed help, which some people don't get because of the stigma associated with mental health issues. A total of 431 San Diegans ended their lives in 2016.



Opioid crisis hits rural America hard

The opioid crisis is a major talking point on the national political stage. On www. whitehouse.gov, President Donald Trump said, "Together, we will face this challenge as a national family with conviction, with unity and with a commitment to love and support our neighbors in times of dire need. Working together, we

will defeat this opioid epidemic." Despite much talk by the president and many others, relatively little has been done to date to combat the crisis, which continues to grow. It is a problem for all parts of the nation, including rural areas. According to a May 1 report in the Journal of the American Medical Association, "Drug overdose deaths are at unprecedented levels in the United States."

According to the National Safety Council, 63,632 Americans died of drug overdoses in 2016. Over 42,000 of those deaths – about two-thirds – were due to opioids. The council recently published a white paper titled, "Prescription Nation 2018." In it, Deborah A. P. Hersman, president and CEO of the National Safety Council, said, "Our nation is confronting the most fatal drug crisis in U.S. history." The paper is available for download from www.nsc.org.

The opioid crisis – and drug dependency in general - is a nationwide problem. Too many people think of it as an "inner city" or "urban" issue and treat it as such. However, rural America has been hit especially hard by the drug epidemic and dealing with the crisis can be significantly harder in rural areas due largely to the lack of available treatment options.

For many living in rural areas, the nearest treatment center for addiction is a two- or three-hour drive away. The expense of such a trip – including time away from work and, possibly, the need to pay for child care – may be financially untenable. Treatment may prove to be out of reach.

Indeed, the lack of local health care may be not only hindering treatment but contributing to the problem as well. For many, prescription pills lead to addiction when other options for pain management, like physical therapy, are not available nearby.

Another impediment to treatment may be the view of many that drug addiction is some sort of "moral failing." Fear of being judged and condemned by family and friends can keep addicts from reaching out to the support system they need.

Recovering from opioid dependence is not simply a matter of "getting clean." It can take months or even years to recover

from the bodily changes caused by opioid abuse. The cravings can crop up again long after an addict has stopped using. It is why many recovering addicts can "fall off the wagon," even if they have been clean for years.

Therefore, ongoing treatment and therapy are essential.

The National Safety Council has prescribed six key actions states should take to combat the crisis, including mandating prescriber education, implementing opioid prescribing guidelines, integrating prescription drug monitoring programs into clinical settings, improving data collection and sharing, treating opioid overdose and increasing availability of opioid use disorder treatment.

To date, only Nevada and New Mexico have taken all six actions. Ten states plus the District of Columbia have taken five of the key actions: Arizona, Connecticut, Delaware, Georgia, Michigan, New Hampshire, North Carolina,

FALLBROOK - The Jack E. John's Fallbrook Family Health Center has announced the expansion of its Behavioral Health Center. The center now offers individual and family therapy as well as psychiatric evaluation and management of medications for the treatment of mental health disorders

Fifteen years ago, supported by a grant from the Fallbrook Regional Health District, the Fallbrook Family Health Center became one of the first in the county to offer limited psychiatric services. Psychiatric treatment was provided by physicians in residency training at the University of California San Diego and overseen by longtime Fallbrook psychiatrist Dr. Tim

Recently, helped by funding provided by the federal government under provisions of former President Barack Obama's health care law, the Family Health Center has been able to establish a Behavioral Health Department, offering a more comprehensive

array of mental health services. Adjacent to the medical clinic, the Behavioral Health Center boasts 4,200 square feet, with clinical space for clinical and administrative staff, groups and educational classes. In addition to the University of California San Diego psychiatrists who continue their work at the clinic on Saturdays, weekday psychiatric care is provided by a psychiatric mental-health nurse practitioner. Individual and family therapy is provided by two licensed clinical social workers and one is a bilingual Spanish-speaking therapist.

Michelle Bass, regional behavioral health manager, said she is excited by the clinic's potential to address the mental health needs of the Fallbrook community.

"Our exceptional clinicians are truly committed to supporting our patients as they make changes toward being happier and fulfilled," Bass said. "We understand that good health is not just the absence of disease, but the health, energy

and focus needed to create the life one truly deserves."

Mental health conditions treated at the Behavior Health Center include depression, bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, anxiety, panic disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder. The center is able to treat children, adults and the elderly. MediCal, Medicare and private insurances are accepted. Patients who are uninsured may qualify for a sliding fee scale based on household income and family size.


A special advantage of the center is its integration with the medical clinic. Murphy said that physical conditions, such as diabetes and high blood pressure, are often better stabilized when a patient's mental health conditions are also being addressed. Being located in the same building, it is easy for mental health staff and medical clinic staff to work together when collaboration and coordination is needed to maximize improvement.

Murphy, who continues his supervisory work at the clinic, said that Fallbrook is fortunate to have its own community mental health clinic, which is unique for a community of its size. He credits years of support by the Fallbrook Regional Health District, the vision of the community clinic's previous CEO, Jack E. Johns, and the commitment of Lori Holeman, the current CEO of Community Health Systems.

Murphy said he wants to see the center continue to grow.

"I hope to see the center evolve into a truly full-service mental health clinic, offering the continuum of mental health services for any disorder, whether mild or severe, so that every resident of Fallbrook can have ready access to needed care," Murphy said.

The Jack E. John's Fallbrook Family Health Center's Behavioral Health hours of operations are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays. It is closed on Sundays. For any questions or to schedule an appointment, call (760) 451-4770.





'South Pacific' is 'Some Enchanted Evening'

"Some Enchanted Evening"... "Bloody Mary is the girl for me"... "I'm Gonna Wash that Man Right Outa My Hair"..."There is Nothing Like a Dame"..."I'm in Love with a Wonderful Guy"..."Happy Talk"..."Honey Bun" are just of few of the memorable tunes from the best show of this season "South Pacific" thanks to San Diego Musical Theatre.

James Michener won the Pulitzer Prize in 1948 for his fictional story "Tales of the South Pacific." A short time later the famous musical team of Richard Rogers and Oscar Hammerstein II joined forces with Josh Logan to turn it into one of the best musicals for all times. In 1950, the stage play "South Pacific" won 11 Tony Awards and again in the 2008 revival it knocked down even more of them.

Locally "South Pacific" is being directed by Kristen Chandler for the San Diego Musical Theatre company. It should go down in the annals of local theatre as everyone's pick for the best show of the year.

Partnered with musical director Don Le Master, this show has all of the elements of a runaway hit for SDMT. Remaining true to the score, Le Master conducts his merry music makers (I counted 17 in all) through each familiar song with perfection. Truly a lush big band sound which backed up the pitch perfect songs.

Michelle Miles enhances the drama with her lighting design which sets the mood for Randy Slovacek's memorable choreography through Mike Buckley's ingenious set design.

Kevin Anthenill developed the sound which even includes the rush of the ocean's waves meeting the shore. The sound is clear and precise. Jane Pitcher hits the mark with the costumes while proving his skill once again is Peter Herman for hair and wig design.

And so it goes. If you listen, you

can hear Bali Hai calling. "South Pacific" beckons to a faraway shore in the French Polynesian islands. Set at the end of WWII this lyrical tale is wrapped in song about love and prejudice.





World War II veteran Roberds, 98, takes Honor Flight

Longtime Fallbrook resident Bud Roberds, a 98-year-old World War II veteran, recently enjoyed "a wonderful trip" when he joined 79 other veterans in traveling from San Diego to Washington D.C. – with all expenses paid – courtesy of Honor Flight San Diego.

HFSD is a non-profit branch of the nationwide Honor Flight Network which consists of over 130 independent "hubs" across America. Honor Flight's mission is "to transport America's veterans to Washington, D.C. to visit those memorials dedicated to honor the service and sacrifices of themselves and their friends."

"I was impressed with the organization," said Roberds. "It was all top-notch."

Roberds plays the piano at Peking Wok Restaurant in Bonsall – his current schedule has him providing background tunes for diners Tuesday through Thursday evenings from 5:30 to 9 p.m. – and Jim Mendelson, a longtime patron of the restaurant, hooked up Roberds with the people at Honor Flight.

Roberds, who broke his right leg last November when he took a tumble while visiting Peking Wok on an off night, recuperated in time to make the Honor Flight trip the weekend of May 4-6. He was accompanied by his son, Bill.

"Each veteran has a guardian (on the trip), and if you don't have one, they assign one to you," said Roberds. "So my son volunteered to be my guardian."

The American Airlines Honor Flight departed San Diego the morning of May 4 and touched down that afternoon at Baltimore-Washington International Airport.

"My first surprise was when we landed there was a group of about 50 people greeting us, saying thanks for your service, bless you and all that kind of stuff," said Roberds. "Men, women and children. I was really taken by that"

The group stayed at hotel in Baltimore and enjoyed a welcome dinner. The next morning, the veterans were up early to board a bus to Washington D.C., where they would spend the day touring war memorials and other historic sites. Each veteran was given a wheelchair, which was pushed by their guardian.

The buses carrying the Honor Flight heroes always had the right of way when traveling from one location to the next.

"In D.C., every place the bus went we had a police escort," said Roberds. "We went through red lights."

Honor Flight provided special shirts for the veterans to wear and those shirts prompted an outpouring of thanks and good wishes

"We were at the Lincoln Memorial and people would see us, stop and say, 'thank you for your service,'" said Roberds, eyes tearing up at the memory. "I get choked up."

Roberds said the touring lasted all day.

"The World War II Memorial, I was impressed with," said Roberds. "That was the biggest. Then we saw the Korean War Veterans Memorial and the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. And we visited the Washington Monument and the Lincoln Memorial. The Lincoln Memorial...that's pretty heavy," said Roberds, his eyes getting moist once again

Upon returning to Baltimore, the group enjoyed dinner at the hotel, recounting the activities of the day.

"Most of the veterans (on the trip) were World War II but we're kind of running out of those guys," said Roberds. "Then there was a small bunch from the Korean and a smaller group from the Vietnam."

Roberds was drafted and joined the U.S. Army in March 1943. He went through basic training at Fort Custer (Michigan) in the Military Escort Guard unit, and his first assignment was guarding German POWs at Fort McClellan

(Alabama).
Roberds was transferred to a 40

mm anti-aircraft artillery unit in 1944, went to Europe in December 1944 and entered Germany in February 1945. His unit joined General George Patton's Third Army when it crossed the Rhine River in March 1945. Roberds' unit stayed on the west side, protecting the troops while engineers – under heavy fire – installed a pontoon bridge so that tanks could cross.

Roberds' unit was guarding an airport north of Munich when the German war ended. He stayed in Munich another year as part of the occupation force before returning to the U.S. in March 1946. Roberds was discharged April 5, 1946.

Roberds said the most memorable part of his Honor Flight trip was "that return to San Diego."

"As we were coming into land (at San Diego International Airport) the pilot told us to look out the window," said Roberds. "Then we saw all these police cars lined up with their lights on to welcome us home."

Once in the terminal, the group took an elevator down a level, and when the doors opened the veterans were greeted by a throng of cheering people. Patriotic music played in the background as the veterans and their guardians slowly navigated their way through the crowd, shaking hands on both sides as the procession aisle.

"Bill thought there were at least a thousand people there," said Roberds. "They were just lined up – men, women and children on both sides. My son was pushing me through and they're shaking your hand, saying 'thanks for your service,' and 'welcome home to San Diego'. Old people, middleage, and kids. One little kid gave me a cookie and another little kid handed me a flag and they say, 'thanks for your service.'

"God almighty," continued Roberds, the memory causing his eyes to tear up like they did that day. "A lady gave me a tissue. When I was talking to other guys, they said they had tears. It was one of the most amazing group things I've been involved with. This really touched me. It was the end (of the trip), but the climax."

Roberds, a native of San Jacinto, graduated from UCLA even though he didn't finish his senior year. He was halfway through his senior year when he was drafted.

"My senior year we took midterms and the rule was if you passed your midterms and you went into the service, they give you credit for the rest of the year," explained Roberds, who took – and passed – his midterms the week before he reported to duty.

Roberds, who as the son of a musician grew up learning to play various instruments,

taught music at a school in San Jacinto for nine years before he and his wife, Jewell, moved to Fallbrook in 1956. Roberts was employed as a music teacher by both the Fallbrook Elementary and Fallbrook High School districts for four years before he became full-time at the high school in 1960.

Roberds counts his two children – Bill (class of 1969) and Lorraine (class of 1972) – among the students he taught at Fallbrook High before retiring from the school in 1979.

Roberds is a member of the California Retired Teachers Association and a parishioner at St. Peter the Apostle. He has been performing at Peking Wok since 1990 (the restaurant was in Vista back then) and still drives himself to and from work. His mind is razor sharp.

Roberds sometimes is too active for his own good, as was the case in 2007 when, at age 87, he broke his left leg.

"I was putting up Christmas decorations and fell off the roof

onto the concrete," said Roberds with a guilty smile.

Roberds bounced back from that injury, just as he has from

his most recent fall, proving the saying, "you can't keep a good man down."

of fire sprinklers and legislative barriers to its use. Research has proven that home fire sprinklers can cut the risk of dying in a home fire by 80 percent.

"The alarming number of home fire deaths and injuries each year should serve as a call to action," Lorraine Carli, NFPA's vice president of outreach and advocacy and HFSC's president, said. "On Home Fire Sprinkler Day, we hope to illuminate the fire problem and its solution. Taking collective action will send a powerful message that fire sprinklers are widely accepted and must be required in all new homes."

Safety advocates in the U.S. and Canada will be hosting a variety of events, including side-by-side fire sprinkler demonstrations and fire department open houses featuring fire sprinkler information.

While there won't be any events in Southern California, residents can still take the time to learn about new-home dangers, get the facts about lifesaving sprinkler technology and make progress against the home fire problem.

by all U.S. model building codes. California, Maryland, Washington, D.C., and hundreds

of U.S. communities have adopted this requirement. Challenges to adoption exist in many other states.

Fire sprinkler installation in homes lags behind installation in other properties with lower fire death rates, such as schools, hospitals and hotels. They lag in part due to myths, confusion and opposition by some groups.

Modern home fire sprinklers are inexpensive to install at about \$1.35 per sprinklered square foot, nationally, according to the National Fire Protection Association.

Fire sprinklers reduce the risk of dying in a home fire by 80 percent and reduce the risk of property damage by 70 percent, according to the association.

Because the sprinkler responds to the fire automatically and while the fire is still small, it controls the fire until the fire department arrives, slowing the spread of heat and poisonous smoke.

Home fire sprinklers give residents more time to escape a fire safely, which prevents injuries and saves lives.

The sprinkler controls fire damage and confines it, which protects lives as well as surrounding rooms, limiting property damage.

property damage.

Responding firefighters work in far less dangerous conditions when a home fire is controlled by

a fire sprinkler.

Fire sprinklers are usually supplied by the household water main. A tank and pump can be used where needed in any climate. As with other plumbing, the piping is hidden behind walls and ceilings. Sprinkler covers can be

used to conceal sprinklers.

Home fire sprinklers operate individually. In a fire, the sprinkler closest to it activates. In the vast majority of home fires just one sprinkler is needed to control the flames.

Sprinklers are activated by the high temperature of a fire – typically between 135-165°F. Cooking fumes or signaling smoke alarms cannot activate sprinklers.

Home fire sprinklers are designed to flow between 10-25 gallons of water per minute, which is 10-15 times less water flow than fire department hoses, with far less pressure.

Learn to read a nursery plant tag

FALLBROOK - Shopping for new plants for a home can be an exciting undertaking. Nurseries and garden centers are often home to dozens of types of plant species that come in various colors, leaf variations and sizes. Such variety can make choosing plants more fun while also making the process of buying plants a bit complicated, especially for novices. Thankfully, plant tags can help consumers make informed decisions.

Understanding how to read plant tags is key to making good choices. Such labels contain a lot of information, but once a person knows how to decode that data, they are well on the way to choosing the right plants.

First, the common name of the plant tends to be the most noticeable word or words on the tag. It is the name the plant is referred to outside of scientific circles. Most plants have one or more common names in addition to their botanical name.

The label lists the scientific botanical name too. Scientific names are also known as the Latin names of the plant. Such names will be written in italics on the tag and are usually one or two words. The scientific name includes the genus and the species of the plant.

A plant tag may further describe the type of plant by including the cultivar. A cultivar is the variation on the species. It may describe a size or color variation. The cultivar

is listed in single quotations by the scientific name.

The tag should list how much sun exposure the plant requires to thrive. It may be anywhere from full sun to full shade.

Height and spread are of concern. The label frequently includes the maximum growing height and width the plant should reach when mature. It gives gardeners an understanding of just how much room the plant will take up in the garden and how to space plants in a landscape.

How much water the plant requires may be featured on the tag as well. It helps gardeners know if they need soil to be damp or relatively dry.


Sometimes, the tag will list a hardiness or zone number. Tags that list zones will describe the coldest zone in which the plant can exist. Otherwise, it will give a range. Many annuals will not list

a hardiness zone because they are not expected to last beyond one

The tag should designate the plant as an annual or perennial. Annuals are not expected to last through the winter and will need to be replanted the following year. Perennials can over-winter and will regenerate year after year.

Tags also may list information such as special care needs, drought tolerance, uses for the plant and when the plant blooms. Some plant labels will inform gardeners if the plants were produced organically or without genetically modified practices. Trademark information also may be included.

Plant tags provide gardeners with important information for selecting and growing plants. When noted, tags help gardeners make the right selections and keep plants as healthy as possible.

Cal Fire suspends burn permits in San Diego County

EL CAJON - After a dry winter, warming temperatures are quickly drying out the abundant annual grass crop. The increasing fire danger posed by the high volume of dead grass and hotter, drier conditions in the region is prompting Cal Fire San Diego to suspend all burn permits for outdoor residential burning within the State Responsibility Area of San Diego County. The suspension took effect May 14 and bans all residential outdoor burning of landscape debris such as branches and leaves.

"We are reminding the public that this last winter was dryer than last year,' said Chief Tony Mecham, Cal Fire San Diego/ San Diego County Fire Chief. "The abundant dry grass will only serve as a fuse to the heavier vegetation that still covers our

"The importance of defensible space cannot be over emphasized, but just as important is that residents conduct their clearance activities in a safe and responsible

manner." continued Mecham. "This includes using the proper tools and limiting clearance activities to the early morning hours when the humidity is up and the temperatures are down."

Since Jan. 1, Cal Fire and firefighters across the state have already responded to over 920 wildfires. While outdoor burning of landscape debris by homeowners is no longer allowed, Cal Fire is asking residents to ensure that they are prepared for wildfires by maintaining a minimum of 100 feet of defensible space around every home and building on their

Here are some tips to help prepare homes and property:

• Clear all dead and or dying vegetation 100 feet from around all structures.

• Landscape with fire resistant/ drought tolerant plants

• Find alternative ways to dispose of landscape debris like chipping or hauling it to a biomass energy or green waste

The department may issue restricted temporary burning permits if there is an essential reason due to public health and safety. Agriculture, land management, fire training, and other industrial-type burning may proceed if a Cal Fire official inspects the burn site and issues a special permit.

The suspension of burn permits for residential landscape debris does not apply to campfires within organized campgrounds or on private property. Campfires may be permitted if the campfire is maintained in such a manner as to prevent its spread to the wildland. A campfire permit can be obtained at local fire stations or online at PreventWildfireCA.





Make moving much easier



 $FALLBROOK-It\ should\ come$ as no surprise that spring kicks off one of the busiest times of year in the housing market. Warm weather makes it more comfortable to see and display homes, leading to more listings and open houses.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the average person in the United States changes residences more than 11 times in his or her lifetime. Real Estate Round-Up: 'American Dream' getting tougher to achieve

Remember the good 'ole "American Dream of Home Ownership?" I do. It was something our parents cared deeply about, and their parents cared even more deeply about. It was a statement that you had roots, stability, status and an assumed level of happiness. After all, it was a place to raise your family, a place to relax after a hard day, a place to fulfill your dreams. Sadly, this dream may never come true for our children and/or some of our friends.

The housing market is constantly under attack by well-meaning groups and legislation meant to improve our lives. Just this past week, the California Energy Commission voted to require that solar panels be built into new homes starting in 2020. This decision didn't come before our state legislators, it didn't come before the voters, it was passed by hand-selected appointed people who have one focus, as if it is in a vacuum, and that is to lessen our carbon footprint, no matter what.

This ruling applies to single family homes, condominiums and apartments. Sounds like a great idea from the perspective of lowering our carbon footprint, but what else does it affect? Imagine adding \$20,000 to the cost of every new dwelling? That is the estimate the California Builders Association said it will cost per dwelling. We already live in a state where only 29 percent of our population can afford to purchase a median-priced home, which is \$564,830 in the state of California and a whopping \$625,400 in San Diego County – over half a million

Another attack on the housing market is coming in the form of something that many people will say makes sense. In November, you will get to vote for or against "rent

We all have heard stories of how expensive rent is in Fallbrook and across the state, so we should do something to make it more affordable, right? So I think I'll vote in favor of it, right? No. If this rent control goes into effect, it will halt all building of rental units, period. Which means our housing shortage will get worse. Also, the existing rentals will become more expensive, because of simple supply and demand. In addition, it will give

unreasonable protection to renters. So, that "accessory dwelling unit" you just built? Guess what, once you put a tenant into it, you will only be able to remove them for "just cause." Which means that if things are going poorly, even when their lease is up they get to stay because "things just aren't working out" is not "just cause" to evict.

Or how about this? You get a short-term job transfer and you want to return to your little slice of Fallbrook heaven once it's over. You decide to rent your home out during that time because it'd by better to have someone living in your home rather than have it vacant. But when you return, your tenant doesn't have to go anywhere if they don't want to.

So, here's the thing – there are always two sides to every story, and each needs to be heard and evaluated as such. We all want clean air and a place to call home, but every piece of legislation that governs these privileges has a price tag. We may live in the "land of the free" but we all know "nothing is free." So make sure you have the facts from both sides so we can collectively defend the "American Dream."

San Diego County home sales in April are slightly higher than March

SAN DIEGO – The number of homes sold in San Diego County rose slightly in April, compared to the previous month, according to figures released May 10 by the Greater San Diego Association

rose 4 percent in April, while condominium and townhome sales rose 3 percent, according to the association.

Despite the month-over-month increase, sales during the first four months of the year are still Single-family home sales lagging 7 percent behind the same period last year.

"Low inventory continues to create a competitive situation for buyers," association President Steve Fraioli said. "But higher mortgage interest rates are the reality and the trend, so serious buyers will need to be ready with

an offer when the opportunity presents itself."

The median price of singlefamily homes edged up 1 percent from March to April, now standing at \$640,000. That's up more than 8 percent from April 2017, according to the association.

Condo and townhome prices rose by 4 percent over the same span and have reached a record high of \$425,000, which is 10 percent higher than a year ago.





Julian Arteaga will be joining the rugby team at Grand Canyon University in Phoenix, Ariz.; Nathan Chalut will be playing lacrosse at Notre Dame de Namur University in Belmont, Calif.; Emma Christopherson will take the volleyball court for South Dakota State University in Brookings, S.D. and Olivia Engebretson will join the cheer squads at California Baptist

University in Riverside, Calif.

Miles Dewhirst will play volleyball for Concordia University in Irvine, Calif.; Desiree Jones will run track for Regis College in Weston, Mass.; Alexandra Pestolis will battle on the volleyball court for California State University Fullerton and Sebastian Winfield will be a member of the golf team at San Jose State University.

Arteaga, who as a Fallbrook High Warrior earned high school All-American honors in rugby in 2017, also plays on a club team out of San Diego that is competing for a national championship this season. He is looking forward to playing for the Lopes at Grand Canyon University.

"It's really nice," Arteaga said of GCU. "When I went on my visit it was awesome. I'm definitely looking forward to rugby and meeting a lot of new people. I definitely want to take rugby serious, but more than that, I want to focus on what I want to do after college."

Arteaga is going to major in business, with an emphasis on data analytics. He is well aware, however, of the new professional rugby league in America – Major League Rugby.

"If I can keep on playing rugby, I'd like to do that," Arteaga said.

Arteaga said his most memorable moment playing rugby for Fallbrook High came in 2018 when the Warriors played Mira Mesa High School.

"It was senior night, and we were down three or four points and it was like the last play, and we were able to score as time ran out and win the game," Arteaga said.

Chalut started all four years on the varsity lacrosse team and was a prolific goal scorer.

"Stepping on the field for the first time as a freshman," Chalut said of his favorite sports moment at FHS. "It was all new to me, and it was amazing to see the whole crowd. The atmosphere was amazing."

Chalut earned all-league first team recognition as a freshman when the Warriors made it to the CIF championship game. He also helped the Warriors make the playoffs this year.

Notre Dame de Namur is a small Catholic institution located on the San Francisco Peninsula. It is the third-oldest college in California and serves approximately 1,600 full and part-time students.

"The main reason why I chose it is I wouldn't be going to a huge school where everyone is identified as a number," Chalut said. "The coach said to me, 'when you're here, you're actually a student, not just a somebody. You're going to be a part of this school."

Chalut plans to major in kinesiology.

"Hopefully it can spark my career to be a physical therapist," Chalut said.

Christopherson, a four-year varsity starter, was her team's MVP and a first team, all-league selection her senior season, when she recorded 284 kills, 13 aces, 122 digs and 25 solo blocks. Interestingly, she said one of her most memorable sports moments came in a match that ended in a defeat to Sage Creek High School.

"My junior year we made it to the first round of CIF (playoffs), and I had my three best friends on the team," Christopherson said. "It was a really, really hard game, but we showed up and played with heart. That was a game that I really felt like a part of a team. Even though we did end up losing, I really feel like we played our best and played with our hearts."

Christopherson said she'll also cherish her team's victory over Valley Center last fall on senior night.

"It's almost like a magical night, and you just want to do your best," Christopherson said. "I felt that was

a super-memorable night that I'll remember the rest of my life."

Christopherson will have plenty of fan support when she plays for the Jackrabbits of South Dakota State University.

"My family is from South Dakota, and I have a bunch of family that's alumni from there," Christopherson said. "I went to (volleyball) camp there my sophomore year while visiting my family in the summer, and I fell in love with the campus."

Christopherson, an outstanding student, has been accepted into the nutrition-dietician program at South Dakota State University.

Engebretson earned All-American honors in cheer her senior year. Last year, she was named MVP of the school's cheer squad, and during her sophomore year she earned the Warrior Award.

Engebretson is going to a cheer powerhouse in California Baptist University.

"The cheer program there has won the national competition every year since 2013," Engebretson said, who added that she'll be on both the cheer squad and the cheer competition team.

Engebretson, who is going to major in business, said she enjoyed her time at Fallbrook High.

"It's a really small community and you get to know everyone," Engebretson said. "Everyone here is very uplifting and supportive, so I really like that."

Dewhirst, who last year played on a Seaside Volleyball Club team that earned a bronze medal as the third-best team in the nation in its age division, said one of his favorite moments as a Fallbrook High Warrior came early in his career when he blocked the shot of a high-profile opponent.

"It was the first time I actually made a volleyball play," Dewhirst said. "It was my freshman year, I didn't know what I was doing and I was super nervous. I just got out there, and he swung and I just blocked him straight down."

Dewhirst said he plans to have fun playing for the Eagles of Concordia University.

"It's a small school but the volleyball program is getting a lot of traction there," Dewhirst said. "People are coming out to the games. That's what I'm really

excited for – putting on a show for all the kids there." Dewhirst said he is going to major

Dewhirst said he is going to major in graphic design, with an emphasis on digital arts. "Hopefully (after college) I

can just get into a firm because Concordia is right in Irvine, and it's kind of a hub for that job," Dewhirst said. "I'm really stoked for that. It's a double-whammy. I get to play volleyball, and I get to study what I want to do."

Jones said her most memorable sports moment at Fallbrook High was being the team captain for the varsity track and field team her junior year. She added that she challenged herself each year in track.

"Every year since my freshman year I've been doing a different event," Jones said, who has competed in the 100, 200, 400 and 800 meter races and also run cross country. "I'm proud of what I've accomplished thus far."

Jones, who has consistently maintained a GPA of 4.0 or higher, is excited to be attending Regis College, a private Catholic college located just 12 miles from downtown Boston.

"Back in my freshman year I decided to wanted to become a lawyer," Jones said. "I plan to major in criminal justice first and minor in pre-law and from there hopefully switch over to Boston University and get my law degree there."

Jones said her high school experience "overall was pretty great"

"Everyone here has been so helpful," Jones said. "I'm going to miss Fallbrook but I'm kind of excited for what is going to come in the future."

Pestolis was captain of the junior varsity volleyball teams that won league titles her freshman and sophomore years, and she earned awards as MVP and Most Inspirational. She didn't play for Fallbrook her junior and senior years, electing instead to hone her skills playing for the Laguna Beach Volleyball Club.

A defensive specialist, Pestolis said she can't wait to compete at the Division I level for California State University Fullerton.

"I'm really excited to be a part of the Big West Conference, which is one of the biggest conferences in volleyball," Pestolis said. "My coach (Ashley Preston) said I have a very good chance of playing as a freshman, so I'm very excited for

"I definitely had to grind really

Winfield attended Fallbrook High before transferring to Oasis High School, which offers independent study, halfway through his sophomore year so he could travel to golf tournaments while in school. Winfield plays on the Elite Tour and last year he won the NCJGA Thanksgiving Shoot Out Tournament when he shot 72 the first day and 69 the second day for a three-under par 141.

Winfield said his highlight playing for Fallbrook came this season when the Warriors won the Valley League

"We were able to win as a team, and I was league player of the year," Winfield said. "And we also won the league tournament as a team, and I won the league tournament as an individual."

As a San Jose State University Spartan, Winfield will play Division I golf at a school that recently invested heavily in its golf program.

"They just finished building a \$12 million facility on campus exclusively for the golf team," Winfield said. "Their home course, Pasatiempo Golf Club, is one of the most elite golf clubs in the world, and their schedule is insane. The courses they play and the teams they play... it's awesome."

Winfield would love to someday make the PGA Tour but plans to teach golf if he can't make it on the professional circuit.

"I want to try playing professionally – that's my dream," Winfield said. "But if that doesn't work out, I love teaching."

Rossi won three events while finishing second in a fourth competition. Franco had two first-place marks and was also on the Vikings' 4x100 relay team

Vallecitos placed in all but two events despite having only a week of practice. Rain postponed the softball tournament at Warner Elementary School from April 19 to April 26, and the team was

only able to practice sprinting, jumping, and pacing techniques (for distance races) three times prior to the May 3 meet.

The Rossi sisters took the top two positions in the girls long jump with Kelsey Rossi achieving a distance of 12'6" and Julia Rossi obtaining a mark of 12'2". Kelsey Rossi cleared 3'9" to win the girls high jump and also won her 200-meter dash race. Her time of 6:37 in the mile gave her second place.

Franco cleared 4'3" to win the boys high jump with Vallecitos sixth-grader Edgar Ortega placing second at 3'11". Franco also won the seventh-grade boys 200-meter dash. Franco, Ortega, sixth-grader Rodrigo Anaya, and sixth-grader Armando Yanez comprised the third-place 4x100 quartet. Ortega added a second-place time of 6:01 in the mile.

"We have such a small team and we were so young, it bodes well for next year," Hanbeck said.

relay races at finals

The Frontier Conference did not have separate leagues for track and field this year, nor were there team league champions. The individual league champions were decided at the conference finals May 10 at Mira Mesa High School, and Bonsall High School took first place in three of the four relay races.

The Legionnaires won the boys 4x100, girls 4x100, and girls 4x400 relay races while placing second in the boys 4x400 event. Individual second-place finishes were obtained in the boys 400-meter and 3,200-meter races. The boys 300-meter hurdles and 1,600-meter run events also had a third-place Bonsall finisher, and Bonsall took third through seventh place in the girls 400-meter run.

"It was awesome," said Bonsall coach Al Greene.

Greene prepared his runners for

the relay races. "We focused pretty heavily on the handoffs," Greene said. "We had enough fast runners that I thought we could put together a strong relay team."

Streich, Ademola, Molino, and Alex Greene had a winning time of 46.16 seconds. The second-place Liberty Charter relay team finished in 47.10 seconds.

Bonsall's girls 4x100 relay team of sophomore Najia Lamb, junior Makailey Lewis, sophomore Faith Gioia, and junior Delainy Reinard won their race in 54.40 seconds. The second-place Liberty Charter quartet took 57.41 seconds.

"They handily won that race," Al Greene said.

Greene noted that none of his girls 4x100 runners are seniors. "Looking forward to next year," he said.

Gioia, junior Sara La Russa, sophomore Isabella Ford, and Reinard comprised the Legionnaires' girls 4x400 relay team. They completed their race in 4:28.70.

"That was likely the most exciting race of the day," Greene

Liberty Charter freshman Landon Torres had the lead when Reinard obtained the baton.

"She was probably a good 60 to 70 meters behind the girl in front of her," Greene said of Reinard. "She just closed the distance."

Torres led Reinard by about 10 meters with 110 meters remaining in the race. Reinard not only took the lead but gave Bonsall nearly a three-second margin as Liberty Charter finished in 4:31.52.

"It was fantastic," Greene said. High Tech High Chula Vista won the boys 4x400 relay in 3:35.62. Bonsall's Alex Greene, Streich, senior Lance Starks, and Molino completed their laps in 3:37.59 to take second.

"They ran a really hard-fought race," Al Greene said. "The team

that beat them was just faster."

The High Tech High San Diego boys 4x400 relay team finished third at 3:38.88.

A time of 10:27.52 gave Bonsall junior Max Collier second place in the boys 3,200-meter race, which High Tech High San Diego senior Jaden Rosenthal won in 10:24.68.

"He ran a fantastic race," Greene said of Collier.

The third-place finisher in the boys 1,600-meter race, Gompers sophomore Elias Doumerc, had a time of 10:30.68. Bonsall sophomore Austin Alanis placed seventh at 11:27.98.

Alex Greene took second place in the boys 400-meter race. Liberty Charter sophomore Isaac Green had a winning time of 52.60 seconds. Greene completed his lap in 53.14 seconds. Molino had the fourth-place time of 54.02 seconds and Bonsall junior Nick Murphy took seventh place with a 56.36-second performance.

The May 4 preliminaries at Mira Mesa High School did not include the 1,600-meter or 3,200-meter races nor were the relay races contested, but for the rest of the events the athletes with the top nine times or distances in each event advanced to the league

The nine qualifiers in the girls 400-meter run included five Bonsall girls. Reinard had the third-place time of 1:04.45 in the final, Gioia finished fourth at 1:04.75, La Russa completed her lap in 1:07.65 for fifth place, Isabella Ford earned sixth place with a 1:08.82 performance, and sophomore Abigayle Ford had a time of 1:09.17 which was worth seventh place. "It was exciting," Al Greene said.

Bonsall senior Randy Kasa had not participated in track and field prior to this year, nor had he run hurdles, but in his final high school race his time of 47.75 seconds gave him third place in the boys 300-meter hurdles. "I think he did pretty well," Greene said.

Starks had the third-place time of 4:46.94 in the boys 1,600-meter run. Collier was sixth at 4:56.18 and Alanis earned 11th place with a 5:14.94 metric mile.

The girls 300-meter hurdles final included a fourth-place time of 1:04.20 for Bonsall senior Alexandria Williams. Lamb was the seventh-place girls 100-meter dash finisher and had a time of 13.55 seconds.



Starks placed seventh in the boys 800-meter race with a time of 2:08.25.









"We have more than 5,300 volunteers who have committed to serve their community at the polls this election, but we still have an urgent need for 600 more including those who are bilingual in one or more of our covered languages," Registrar Michael Vu said. "Our bilingual volunteers help citizens who may not be proficient in English feel comfortable and informed by voting in their first language."

Poll workers receive a stipend ranging from \$100 to \$175 depending on the assignment, and those who are bilingual receive an additional \$15 if they are assigned to provide language assistance to voters.

Poll workers must be registered voters in the state of California or must be permanent residents in the United States and have transportation to their assigned polling location. They will also need access to the internet to complete an online training and attend a two-hour class.

County supervisors vote to explore dispatch center consolidation

SAN DIEGO - The San Diego County Board of Supervisors voted May 8, to explore a possible consolidation of the region's five public safety dispatch centers.

County and city of San Diego officials have long considered merging the San Diego Fire-Rescue Department, North County Dispatch, Heartland Communications, Escondido and Cal Fire and County Fire dispatch centers. North County Dispatch and Heartland, in particular, are both "bursting at the seams and actively planning for replacement facilities," according to a county report.

"Consolidating our five dispatch

centers in the region has been talked about for a long time," Supervisors Dianne Jacob said. "The time though is now to move forward."

The board voted to direct the county chief administrative officer to begin planning for a consolidated center comprised of the five dispatch groups. A merger may "bring cost savings and operational efficiencies" while offering "more robust" services, according to the

San Diego city officials decided in March to explore merging fire and medical dispatch centers based on the recommendation of an independent study presented to the

City Council's Public Safety and Livable Neighborhoods Committee.

The study, competed by Citygate Associates, cited space inadequacies at the city's 11,563-square-foot Kearny Mesa center. The study also said the city will need to find or build a new dispatch center by 2020, even if it doesn't merge operations.

The elected bodies in charge of the five dispatch centers will eventually vote on a proposal once staff and consultants iron out a concrete proposal, according to a Citygate consultant. City officials said that is expected to occur by the end of the year.

FBI releases IC3 2017 Internet Crime Report and calls for increased public awareness

WASHINGTON – The FBI released the Internet Crime Complaint Center 2017 Internet Crime Report, May 7, which highlights trending internet scams. The information in the report was compiled from complaints of suspected criminal internet activity filed with the IC3 in 2017. The report's data represents 301,580 complaints with reported losses in

excess of \$1.4 billion.

The top three crime types reported by victims in 2017 were nonpayment or nondelivery, personal data breach and phishing. In addition to the 2017 statistics, the IC3 2017 Internet Crime Report contains information about the IC3, an explanation of the support provided to law enforcement by the IC3 and hot

topics for 2017, including business email compromise, ransomware, tech support fraud and extortion.

The IC3 received its 4 millionth consumer internet crime complaint Oct. 12, 2017, and has received 4,063,933 total complaints since its inception in 2000. With the release of the 2017 Internet Crime Report, the FBI is increasing public awareness about current internet scams and fraud; reiterating the importance of the IC3 in understanding, mitigating and combating cybercrime and encouraging victims to report internet crime through the IC3. By reporting internet crime, victims are not only alerting law enforcement to the activity but aiding in the overall fight against cybercrime.

To further highlight the need for public support in the fight against cybercrime, the FBI released 30-second public service announcements for radio and television featuring "Criminal Minds" actress Kirsten Vangsness encouraging the public to report suspected internet crime to www. ic3.gov. The public service announcement can be viewed and downloaded at www.fbi.gov as well as through the National Association of Broadcasters Spot Center.

Make some spicy deviled eggs for your next picnic

FALLBROOK - Picnics are often pot luck affairs. While standard picnic fare like potato salad and watermelon are always welcome, spicing things up with something new can make picnics that much more memorable.

The following recipe for

"Sunday Picnic Deviled Eggs" from Neal Corman and Chris Peterson's "Virgil's Barbecue Road Trip Cookbook" (St. Martin's Press) is fairly spicy and can provide a little extra kick at your next picnic.

Sunday Picnic Deviled Eggs Serves 4 to 6

Ingredients:

8 extra-large eggs

1/4 cup mayonnaise

1 teaspoon Creole mustard

1/4 teaspoon Cholula Hot Sauce

1/4 teaspoon ground cumin

1/2 teaspoon kosher salt

1/4 teaspoon cracked black pepper

2 teaspoons finely chopped pickled jalapeño slices

1 teaspoon pickled jalapeño juice

1/2 Hass avocado, peeled and pitted

Pinch of smoked paprika

1 tablespoon chopped fresh cilantro

2 ounces dried Spanish chorizo

To make:

- 1. Place the eggs in a medium pot and cover with cold water. Bring to a boil, cover the pot and remove from the heat. Keep covered for 11 minutes, then remove the eggs from the water and place in a bowl of ice water to stop the cooking process.
- 2. Preheat a sauté pan. Cut the chorizo into very small dice and sauté until crispy. Set aside to cool.
- 3. In a small bowl, combine the mayonnaise, mustard, hot sauce, cumin, salt, pepper, jalapeño, and jalapeño juice.
- When the eggs have cooled, carefully crack the shells and peel under cold running water. Slice the eggs lengthwise and remove the yolks, being careful to leave the whites intact.
- Combine the avocado and egg yolks in a small bowl, and mash together with a fork until smooth.
- Add the avocado mixture to the mayonnaise mixture and blend thoroughly. Spoon the mixture into each half of egg white.
- Dust with the paprika, sprinkle with the cilantro and chorizo, and serve.



Cauliflower popcorn makes for a healthy snack

FALLBROOK - Healthy snacks are a great way to quell hunger pangs without feeling guilty. The following recipe for "Cauliflower Popcorn" from Bob Blumer's "Surreal Gourmet Bites" (Chronicle Books) is a sweet-tasting alternative to unhealthy snacks.

Cauliflower Popcorn

Yields 12 bites

Ingredients:

1 head cauliflower 4 tablespoons olive oil

1 tablespoon salt (or, for a saltfree alternative, Mrs. Dash table blend)

To make:

- Preheat oven to 425 F.
- 2. Cut out and discard cauliflower core and thick stems. Trim remaining cauliflower into florets the size of golf balls.
- 3. In a large bowl, add cauliflower, olive oil and salt. Toss thoroughly.
- Spread cauliflower on a baking sheet (line with parchment paper, if available, for easy cleanup) and roast for 1 hour, or until much of the floret has become golden brown. (That's the caramelization process converting the dormant natural sugars into sweetness. The browner the florets, the sweeter

they will taste.) Turn 3 or 4 times during roasting.

5. Use crumpled up aluminum foil or paper towels to create a false bottom in your popcorn container, fill it with cauliflower, and serve immediately.

6. Note: Raw cauliflower can be precut and refrigerated for up to two days in an airtight bag or a bowl of water. With minimal sacrifice, cauliflower can be cooked earlier in the day and reheated in a 450 F oven for 10 minutes.





Murrieta native and 'The Voice' Season 14 contestant Wildee, known to family and friends as Rachel Fusaro, made her triumphant return to Temecula Friday, May 4, with a concert at Bel Vino Winery.

Wildee performed before "The Voice" judges Blake Shelton, Kelly Clarkson, Adam Levine and Alicia Keys during the blind auditions, but ultimately, she was not selected to move on in the popular hit television series.

"It's one of those things where I knew going into it that I was filling a position they needed," she said, adding that she was looking forward to the exposure the show might give her. "I was excited about that, but I always tried to keep it in perspective because at any moment you could be sent home immediately and that's it."

Wildee said "The Voice" was good about setting expectations for the contestants. Not getting a chair turn for her blind audition was disappointing for the up-and-coming country star; though, she made the best of it and set her mind

to moving forward as an independent artist.

"That was a bummer, but they had some nice things to say too," she said, calling it a "just piece of the puzzle."

While it was difficult to get the rejection, she chose to persevere.

"It was nothing that was devastating to my confidence," she said. "You can't fall into a hole and feel like your world is over because of this."

Wildee, who knew she wanted to be a musician since she was a little girl, hasn't let that rejection slow her down, since then she has performed at shows across the country, including the Bel Vino concert, promoting her new single "Burn" which was released in April.

Since her time on the 'The Voice,' Wildee, who began her musical journey at the age of 9, is focusing on her music full time. She will be opening for Keith Urban this summer as well as opening for Josh Turner at Wilson Creek Winery in Temecula Valley Wine Country June 3.

Her May 4 performance at Bel Vino brought her full circle and back to her early days performing

"It's just really nice to have a homecoming show because I haven't been back in about three years," she said. "It was really cool to come full circle and just see the support. She also recently performed at the iconic Bluebird Cafe, known as "one of the world's pre-eminent listening rooms." The venue gained worldwide recognition as a songwriter's performance space where songwriters perform their songs that have been recorded by chart-topping artists in all genres of music

"So that was pretty crazy because it was only about a month after moving to Nashville that I was asked to sing at the Bluebird," Wildee said. "It is something that was so incredible, it's such a bucket list thing, especially for a country artist. It was so surreal.

Currently, Wildee, whose resume includes performing at the Wagon Wheel Festival in Lake Elsinore with Jason Aldean back in 2009, is focusing on writing songs so she can record a full album she hopes to release in the fall.

"As an independent artist, I have been blessed with all of these opportunities," she said. "Writing with all of this amazing talent in Nashville, the songwriters here are unlike any other place in the world. The talent is just great and the collaboration that I am able to do in writing these songs, well, I just want to continue to grow as an artist."
