# **NCFPD** approves 2023-2024 budget

The North County Fire Protection District board approved the 2023-2024 NCFPD budget.

The board's 5-0 vote Tuesday, Sept. 26, adopted a budget which anticipates \$25,313,900 in revenue. The budget forecasts \$23,719,160 of operational expenses while a \$7,578,000 capital budget will reduce district reserves from \$13,268,403 to \$7,265,103.

"We've established a capital facility reserve account," NCFPD fire Chief Keith McReynolds said.

The \$1,042,000 in the capital reserves is not included in the \$7,265,103 overall reserves. The capital budget also calls for \$4,098,200 for facilities, \$1,436,000 for apparatus, \$528,000 for equipment, \$190,000 for non-firefighting staff vehicles and \$283,100 of debt service. The 2022-2023 capital expenditures were \$3,226,892, including \$1,098,952 of debt service.

The revenue includes money from the fire mitigation fee which is paid by developers to fund the cost of fire department facilities serving the new development. Because the funding is used for capital improvements, it is not required to be spent in a particular fiscal year. The 2023-2024 budget forecasts mitigation fee revenues of \$250,000.

Property tax payments are the fire district's primary source of revenue. The \$20,604,200 of anticipated property tax revenue is complemented by \$3,750,200 of ambulance fee revenue, \$213,000 from fire prevention fees, \$124,500 of interest payments and \$372,000 of other revenue.

The expenditures reflect a 7.82% salary adjustment and a 5% Consumer Price Index increase. Salaries and benefits account for \$19,376,430 of expenditures.

The capital projects include \$2.018.800 for Station 3 in Rainbow. A design-build contract to add 1,740 square feet and renovate another 777 square feet was authorized during the April 25 board meeting; construction is anticipated to begin in February 2024. The replacement or renovation of Station 4 in Pala

48 Ballot drop boxes open for Nov. 7 special election for the Nov. 7 special election and are expected to arrive this week. Only the voters who live in each of those districts can vote in their respective elections. If you're not sure whether you reside in one of the following districts, you can look it up at sdvote.com.

> What do the Registrar's official ballot drop boxes look like?

> The Registrar's official ballot drop boxes are red, white, and blue and feature the Registrar's logo along with the county seal. All boxes are labeled "Official Ballot Drop Box" and constructed from high grade, heavy gauge stainless steel.

> Each ballot drop box is designed to prevent physical damage and unauthorized access to mail ballots. The boxes feature double-locking access doors, anti-pry door jambs, and other anti-theft construction measures. The Registrar's ballot retrieval team is responsible for collecting ballots inside the box.

> How do I return my ballot to an official ballot drop box?

> Mark your ballot, seal your completed ballot inside your return envelope, date and sign your name on the return envelope, and return to one of the Registrar's 48 official ballot drop boxes around the districts, or you can return it in the mail. Remember, your signature is required for your vote to count.

Thirty-nine official ballot drop

boxes are located outdoors and are open 24-hours a day until 8 p.m. on the final day of voting, Nov. 7. Nine are located indoors and only available when the facility is open. Check the location list or the locator tool for details.

On the final day of voting, Nov. 7, all of the Registrar's official ballot drop box locations will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

How do I vote in person?

Early voting began Monday, Oct. 9 at the Registrar of Voters office in Kearny Mesa. Hours run from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. However, the Registrar encourages voters to take advantage of the convenience of voting by mail.

If you prefer to vote early in person and avoid the possibility of long lines, select vote centers will open on Saturday, Oct. 28. You can vote at any vote center around the county.

The vote centers will be open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. until the final day of voting, Tuesday, Nov. 7, when 22 vote centers and the Registrar's office will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

You can find an official ballot drop box or vote center near you inside your voter information pamphlet, or you can look it up online and get additional details at sdvote.com. You can also contact the Registrar of Voters at 858-565-5800 or toll free at 800-696-0136.

# Fallbrook residents attend Reform California Town Hall meeting

SAN DIEGO - More than 100 Fallbrook residents joined Reform California Tuesday, Oct. 10, for a town hall meeting to learn about the fight to stop costly tax hikes and utility rate spikes in California as well as efforts to protect Proposition 13.

The town hall meeting was led by Carl DeMaio, chair of Reform California and former San Diego city councilmember, who is headlining similar events around the county leading up to the 2024 elections.

"Californians already pay the highest taxes and utility rates in the country, and we're fighting to change that by defeating a number of costly and unfair new tax and utility rate hike proposals in the 2024 election," DeMaio said. "Two of the proposals that would increase your taxes are a direct attack on 1978's Proposition 13 – and we need everyone involved in the fight to defeat them and pass the California Taxpayer Protection Initiative next year."

The California Taxpayer Protection Initiative will be on the ballot in 2024, and passing it would strengthen Proposition 13 and make it harder for state and local politicians to impose costly and unfair tax hikes in the future. Specifically, the measure would restore a two-thirds vote for any tax hike, impose a stricter definition on what is a "tax" so

politicians can't call them "fees," require the words "tax increase" be included on the official title of any measure that appears on the ballot that contains a tax hike inside of it and repeal dozens of tax hikes imposed after Jan 1, 2022 - immediately saving taxpayers

"Californians are literally fleeing our state because of the high costof-living and high taxes imposed by reckless politicians - and this ballot measure is a powerful way for voters to say 'enough is enough," DeMaio said.

The town hall also covered the following topics of concern to Fallbrook residents: the seven top tax hikes Reform California is fighting in California today -

including the San Diego County Mileage Tax, County Sales Tax Hike, Savings Tax, Healthcare Tax, Exit Tax and a range of property, income and other special tax hikes; utility rate hikes that are crushing working families - and how we can roll back the rates by eliminating hidden state taxes and mandates and ways to reverse the trend of home insurance companies dropping customers and implementing rate

The three-day trip, which is made at no cost to them, is a time for veterans to visit the memorials built for their sacrifice and to honor them for their service.

Honor Flight San Diego is part of the Honor Flight Network and is one of the approximately 130 hubs nationwide. Honor Flight San Diego is a 501(c)(3) designated nonprofit organization. Top priority is given to the most senior veterans, currently World War II and Korean War, and to veterans who are terminally ill. In 2022, Honor Flight San Diego opened flights to Vietnam veterans to provide a long overdue thank you for their service. For some veterans, it is their first trip to Washington, and for some, it will be their last opportunity.

Honor Flight San Diego is completely funded through individuals, foundations, associations, business owners and corporations. Each Tour of Honor trip costs about \$300,000.

Honor Flight San Diego was started in 2010 by Dave Smith when he took his father, World War II veteran Arthur Smith, on a Lone Eagle Flight for veterans from cities without a hub. He was so inspired by the Honor Flight experience that he got back to San Diego and wanted to volunteer, but since there was no San Diego hub, he created one.

Since 2010, Honor Flight San Diego has flown over 1,800 veterans to Washington for their Tour of Honor.

On each flight, approximately

85-95 veterans travel with their assigned guardian to assist them. The veterans travel at no cost to them. Guardians donate \$900 to help offset the cost of their trip.



#### TEMECULA - Everyone makes mistakes in many areas of life. These mistakes are usually fairly harmless - we took a wrong turn while driving, used the wrong ingredients in a recipe and so on. But sometimes, our mistakes can be costly - especially those connected

#### Too much buying and selling

Heavy trading can disrupt this strategy.

#### Failing to diversify

But not all investments will respond the same way to the same forces for example, stocks and bonds can move in different directions at any given time. Also, trying to "time" the market in this way can lead to bad decisions, such as selling investments whose price has dropped, even if these same investments still have good business fundamentals and strong prospects.

For example, some companies, by the very nature of their business and the type of industry they're in, may consistently pay dividends to their investors even though their stock prices may only show relatively modest price gains over time. If you bought shares of this stock, thinking it had the potential to achieve quite substantial appreciation, you might end up disappointed.

#### Making the wrong comparisons

You're no doubt familiar with some of the most well-known investment benchmarks – the S&P 500, Dow Jones Industrial Average and the Nasdaq Composite. But it might be counterproductive to compare your results against these indexes. If you have a diversified portfolio, you'll own an array of investments that won't fit into any single index or benchmark, so you won't get an apples-toapples comparison. You're better off comparing your portfolio's performance against the only benchmark that really matters – the progress you need to make to help achieve your goals.

Investing will always have its challenges, but you can help make it easier on yourself by staying away from as many mistakes as possible.

Mesa is in the design stage, and \$1,268,100 has been budgeted for that. Another \$463,300 has been budgeted for station expansion, and \$350,000 is budgeted for the remodel of the NCFPD administration building on Main

The district plans to spend \$774,400 for a new Type I engine used for structural fires, \$400,000 for a new brush engine, \$262,000 for a new ambulance, \$192,000 for portable radios, \$125,000 for new engine equipment, \$68,000 for a wheel lift, \$63,000 for gurneys, \$15,000 for a generator and \$20,000 for other equipment. The debt service will cover \$235,100 for Station 5 in Bonsall and \$48,000 for solar energy generation facilities.



#### Taylor wins first and second place awards from San Diego Press Club

SAN DIEGO – Freelance writer Nathalie Taylor, a Reeder Media affiliate since 2003 – 20 years – took home a first and second from the San Diego Press Club on Tuesday, Oct. 3, 2023. The awards were especially significant because the writer only wrote four stories within the judging time frame.

# County to award closed landfill maintenance and repair contracts

The County of San Diego will be issuing one or more contracts for maintenance and repair of closed landfills including the Bonsall Landfill and the Fallbrook 1B Burn Site.

A 3-0 San Diego County Board of Supervisors vote Oct. 11, with Jim Desmond absent and one vacant seat, authorized the director of the county's Department of Purchasing and Contracting to issue a request for statements of qualifications for as-needed engineering, construction management, closed solid waste site maintenance, and repair services and to award up to two contracts after successful negotiation and determination of a fair and reasonable price.

The contracts will have an initial term of one year with four one-year options and an additional six months if needed and will be limited to an annual value of up to \$1,500,000 per contract with the total not to exceed \$15,000,000 over a five-year period.

The county's Department of Public Works (DPW) is responsible for maintaining 21 closed landfills and burn sites including the Bonsall Landfill and the Fallbrook 1B Burn Site. DPW monitors and maintains the sites to ensure groundwater, surface water, and air quality through the capture and control of landfill gas.

The county is also responsible for the development and implementation of remediation actions which may include improvements to existing landfill gas and groundwater systems, import and placement of additional cover material, securing sites with fencing, and removal or consolidation of the waste.

The Bonsall Landfill, which is in the 29400 block of Twin Oaks Valley Road, operated from 1968 to 1985 and contains about 1.8 million tons of refuse. The landfill was constructed without a liner or a leachate collection system (leachate is caused by precipitation percolating through the waste in a landfill). The county has been responsible for maintaining the 122-acre landfill site (including 46 acres of the actual landfill footprint) since its closure.

When garbage was being burned in Fallbrook, the County of San Diego was responsible for waste disposal but did not own all of the landfills and burn sites. In some cases, the county had contracts with private property owners who operated the burn sites.

The Fallbrook 1A burn site is off of Mercedes Road and is still privately-owned. The Fallbrook 1B and Fallbrook 1C burn sites are on Stone Post Way approximately 500 yards away from each other; the county owns a portion of the Fallbrook 1B burn site and all of the Fallbrook 1C burn site.

The county purchased the majority of the Fallbrook 1C burn site, which was used as a public landfill from 1955 through 1959, in 2004 and acquired the remainder of that former burn site after receiving a state grant for remediation in 2013; that area is now fenced open space and maintained by the county although no further landfill maintenance activities are necessary.

The services authorized by the Oct. 11 Board of Supervisors action include all work required to maintain and repair landfill gas collection and control systems, groundwater monitoring systems, caps and covers, drainage and stormwater systems, and other related services needed to maintain sites in compliance with regulatory mandates and protect public and environmental health.

One contract will be awarded to the primary contractor, and a second contract will be utilized if the primary contractor is unable to perform the as-needed services.

#### **Social Security** announces 3.2% benefit increase for 2024

WASHINGTON - Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits for more than 71 million Americans will increase 3.2% in 2024, the Social Security Administration announced Oct. 12. On average, Social Security retirement benefits will increase by more than \$50 per month starting in January.

More than 66 million Social Security beneficiaries will see the 3.2% cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) beginning in January 2024. Increased payments to approximately 7.5 million people receiving SSI will begin on Dec. 29, 2023. (Note: some people receive both Social Security and SSI benefits).

"Social Security and SSI benefits will increase in 2024, and this will help millions of people keep up with expenses," said Kilolo Kijakazi, Acting Commissioner of Social Security.

Some other adjustments that take effect in January of each year are based on the increase in average wages. Based on that increase, the maximum amount of earnings subject to the Social Security tax (taxable maximum) will increase to \$168,600 from \$160,200.

Social Security begins notifying people about their new benefit amount by mail starting in early December. Individuals who have a personal mySocial Security account can view their COLA notice online, which is secure, easy, and faster than receiving a letter in the mail. People can set up text or email alerts when there is a new message - such as their COLA notice – waiting for them in my Social Security.

People will need to have a my Social Security account by Nov. 14 to see their COLA notice online. To get started, visit www.ssa.gov/ myaccount.

The Social Security Act provides for how the COLA is calculated. The Social Security Act ties the annual COLA to the increase in the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) as determined by the Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

#### Getting the word out about drug abuse

Red Ribbon Week - Oct. 23 to 31 – delivers a strong antidrug message to school children nationwide. I strongly support this annual program, and again this year my office is distributing thousands of Red Ribbon certificates to schools throughout the 75th Assembly District.

In 2021, there were almost 6,000 overdose deaths in California most of them fentanyl-related. That's an increase of 121% in three years. Fentanyl has become the number one killer of persons aged 18 to 45 in San Diego County. The drug is 50 times stronger than heroin and 100 times stronger than morphine. It comes in various forms, and can be made to look like any prescription pill. Even a very small amount can be lethal.

Most fentanyl is smuggled across California's southern border. U.S. Customs and Border Protection seized more than 22,000 pounds of fentanyl between October 2022 and June 2023. That compares to 8,300 pounds seized the previous year. Even though California has spent more than \$1 billion to reign in this deadly epidemic, the problem has grown.

Help is available. Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) is considered the gold standard in treating opioid addictions. However, several areas in San Diego County located within the 75th Assembly District have been identified as Health Professional Shortage Areas (HSPSAs). Lack of treatment options, and the long driving distances involved can limit effective and timely treatments. That can cost lives.

This session, I introduced AB 1233 to help make Naloxone and other fentanyl antidotes more available in tribal areas. The bill was recently signed into law by the Governor. But we need to do all we can to prevent overdoses by spreading the word about the dangers of drug abuse - the message thousands of students receive during Red Ribbon Week.

By using MAT, educational programs like Red Ribbon Week, and enhanced law enforcement against drug traffickers, this deadly scourge can be stopped. We can save thousands of lives.





the 1960s.





# Dragon fruit An exotic organic bounty in Bonsall

Nestled in the Bonsall hills above the San Luis Rey Training Center and horse ranches, sits 15 magnificent acres of exotic beauty. From the road, it's hard to tell what might be growing in perfectly symmetrical rows along the rolling hillsides. But up close it becomes clear you are looking at something unusual for our local landscape, usually teeming with avocado trees, orange groves, or vineyards.

Wallace Ranch Dragon Fruit Farm is the oldest and largest certified organic dragon fruit farm in the United States. The fruit itself is strange at first glance, being oval or elliptical in shape with a spiky outer layer, but it peels quite easily. It ranges from semi-sweet to very sweet, with tiny black seeds, which are edible.

Neva Day, and her partner Dicky Augustus, have owned this farm since 2018. But cultivating an organic dragon fruit farm was not something that was on their bucket list. "Dicky is a Vietnam vet, and we decided to take a trip there to see how the country had changed over the decades. Well at every meal we had there, breakfast, lunch and dinner, a garnish of this beautiful fruit that varied from white, to pink, to a deep red was on a plate. I had never seen it or tasted it before. It was dragon fruit."

For Neva, it was love at first bite. But the thought of having a working dragon fruit farm was never given a thought. That is, until a lucky happenstance.

"After returning from our Asian vacation to our home in Hermosa Beach, we both decided we had it with high density living," Neva said. "So we began a search for a new home in the Fallbrook area in 2017. Actually, we had never heard of Fallbrook, and once we started exploring it was like, where are we? Is this Northern California?"

As luck would have it, the 15-acre Wallace Ranch Organic Dragon Fruit Farm in Bonsall was for sale just as they began serious house hunting. "When I discovered the farm was for sale, I called Dicky and said, "It's absolutely beautiful, and guess what they grow there? He said, 'Let me guess. Avocados or citrus.' And he couldn't believe it when I told him dragon fruit."

Dragon fruit, or as it's known in Mexico and Asia as pitaya or pitahaya, is a fruit that grows on a sub-tropical cactus. It's not exactly a cactus because it still needs a significant amount of water, but only about a third of what avocados need. It's actually a vine and can't take extreme heat or cold. It's also a drought-resistant crop, making it well suited to the Fallbrook and Bonsall micro-climates.

As in any agricultural endeavor, the economic sustainability of a farm is dependent on many factors, not only climate, rainfall, and pest infestations. "Vietnam was exporting tons of dragon fruit into the U.S. But in order to keep the skin of the fruit looking clean and fresh on the long trip here, they began spraying their fruit with a chemical. That process was eventually banned. Plus imports from Mexico and South America were undercutting dragon fruit prices here. I saw this as an opportunity to go totally organic, which is a lot more labor-intensive, but does provide us with a premium price."

Being "certified organic" in California is a complex process that requires adherence to many strict guidelines and regulations. Organic standards address many factors: soil quality, animal raising, pest and weed control, and use of input materials. Inspectors routinely show up inperson to make sure all regulations are met.

With one full time worker, Julio

Robles, several seasonal workers, and many daily hires during picking seasons, Neva and Dicky do much of the work themselves. "Dicky does all the driving, deliveries, and pickups. And I'm out in the farm every day working and managing every stage of the process."

Part of that process is handpollinating up to 30,000 plants. And placing netting on the fruit while still on the vine to protect it from birds and other pests.

The entire 15 acres of the farm isn't just for dragon fruit. There are avocado trees, all kinds of exotic citrus, passion fruit, herbs, teas, and almost anything else that can be eaten by humans, or attract the bees, butterflies, and friendly critters that keep the balance of nature cycling throughout the year.

The gated section of the farm where their residence sits is a veritable garden of paradise with exquisitely manicured trees and plants that all have a purpose. Those purposes can include providing an organic balance to the soil, experimenting with hybrid cross-pollination, or attracting essential friendly insects such as bees, butterflies and praying mantis. Several owl boxes house the majestic birds which can keep thousands of rodents in check over the course of a year

"Sometimes I visit botanical gardens in various cities and states and I say to myself, 'Hmmm. My yard looks better than this," Neva said, beaming with pride.

Dragon fruit here is harvested as a "field pack" crop, which means it is picked and placed in boxes for shipment right in the field. Some fruit is actually on shelves in local markets the same day it was picked.

Neva gets her hands dirty in the organic soil every day as well as operating farming tools and equipment, large and small. Her previous career set her up nicely for her current job description. "I spent my life in retail as a buyer for major companies, like Sears, in their tools divisions. My partner, Dicky, was in building construction so we were the perfect pair to take on this new challenge.'

As many surveys have shown, food retailers and consumers today are very interested in food quality, which goes way beyond mere appearance, as Neva explained. They want to know who the farmer is. They want to know where the food comes from. They want to know that they are helping local communities. What I've learned from other farmers is; A) you need to have a really great work ethic; B) you need to have really thick skin; C) you have to love what you do; and D) you need to always be looking forward and expanding yourself."

Being relatively new to the farming community in Southern California, Neva has gotten involved with local farmers in the Fallbrook/Bonsall area as well as being part of larger farming associations and trade groups.

"I am personally very grateful I got into farming because I did not understand how hard it is to grow food. And how we undervalue that aspect of something that is in our daily lives. And I've made it my personal mission to tell people to respect where your food comes from. When you look at an apple or a dragon fruit, just know how much work went into that piece of fruit sitting on a shelf in the market. There's a lot of love and passion and hard work that goes into every piece of fruit."

# Surplus crops and volunteers needed in Fallbrook area

FALLBROOK - Senior Gleaners of San Diego County, a volunteer organization with a mission to address community hunger, is available to the Fallbrook area with local volunteers.

Joe Strasser of Fallbrook joined its board of directors earlier this year. Strasser serves as the local crew leader. He is working closely with local food distributors, such as the Fallbrook Food Pantry.

The group needs more volunteers and donations of surplus fruit for them to pick. The group specializes in citrus and avocados but will consider other crops as well. They have a 100-pound minimum limit but can help people with small quantities find local places to take it.

Most gleaners volunteer 3-4 hours one day per week, but there are no required minimum commitments. People unable to pick can deliver boxed fruit in their own vehicle and help with

administrative tasks.

Fruit donors should contact the gleaners two to three weeks before they think their fruit may be ready. Near the picking date, they should confirm ripeness by tasting the fruit. Having volunteers pick the fruit means less work to pick and dispose of unwanted fruit and improves the health of the trees.

The donor is given a receipt showing the amount donated for tax deduction purposes. Food donors are protected by the federal Good Samaritan Food Donation Act and Senior Gleaners liability insurance.

"Marry the house, date the rate" is a common phrase in the housing industry, especially since mortgage rates have risen throughout 2023. But it's not just a phrase; it's a strategy too.

# Cal Fire urges caution this Fire Prevention Week, reminding Californians that cooking safety starts with them

SACRAMENTO – Cal Fire is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association to promote this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign: "Cooking safety starts with you. Pay attention to fire prevention."

The campaign provides an opportunity to educate everyone about the simple but important actions individuals can take to keep themselves and those around them safe when cooking. According to the NFPA, the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week, cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries in the United States.

"Cal Fire encourages all Californians to embrace the 2023 Fire Prevention Week theme, 'Cooking safety starts with you," Chief Daniel Berlant, who was recently appointed state fire marshal, said. "Creating fire safe habits in the kitchen will help keep you and your family safe from cooking injuries and ensures you are doing everything you can to prevent a fire from starting in your home while cooking."

"Year after year, cooking remains the leading cause of home fires by far, accounting for almost half (49%) of all U.S. home fires," Lorraine Carli, vice president of outreach and advocacy at NFPA, said. "These numbers tell us that there is still much work to do when it comes to better educating the public about ways to stay safe when cooking."

Cal Fire and NFPA offered some safety tips to help reduce the risk of a cooking fire.

Have a "child- and pet-free zone" of at least 3 feet around the stove or grill and anywhere else hot food or drink is prepared.

Watch what you heat. Always keep a close eye on what you are cooking. Set a timer to remind you that you

Turn pot handles toward the back of the stove to help prevent accidental burns and always watch young children in the kitchen.

Always keep a lid nearby when cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan and turn off

the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled. For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

If you need to use your fire extinguisher, apply the "Pull, Aim, Squeeze, Sweep" method. Pull the pin to break the seal and test the extinguisher. Aim at the base of the fire and ensure you have a means of escape. Squeeze the operating handle to discharge the extinguishing agent.

Sweep from side to side, aiming at the base of the fire until it is completely extinguished. If the fire cannot be extinguished, then retreat to a safe distance from the fire and call 911.

An accessible and working fire extinguisher is fundamental to kitchen safety. Having the correct type of fire extinguisher in an accessible location and knowing how to safely use it is essential to safely being able to put

out a fire in your kitchen.

"Taking a few extra steps while in the kitchen could prevent injury, property damage or even death. Please take these tips seriously and practice them every time you are cooking," Berlant said.



# El Niño lifts hopes for more water, stirs fears of flooding

California reservoirs are brimming at historic levels after a water year described as akin to a "miracle."

Lake Shasta, the largest reservoir in the federal Central Valley Project that provides water to over 3 million acres of farmland, stood last week at 131% of its historic average water level. Lake Oroville, the cornerstone of the State Water Project that supplies water to 27 million people, stood at 136% of its historic average after its water level rose by more than 240 feet.

The dramatic increases in

flood control," said Levi Johnson, acting operations manager for the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation's Central Valley Operations Office.

However, officials said an El Niño pattern doesn't necessarily mean flooding or even assure a year of bountiful rain and water storage opportunities.

"It may not be wet, but it may not be as severely dry as some of the years we've seen recently," said Michael Anderson, state climatologist for the California Department of Water Resources.

Anderson's cautious observation came as state and federal officials previewed the water year that runs from Oct. 1 to Sept. 30 and discussed the 2022-23 water year that just ended.

The phenomenal year brought 33.56 inches of rain, 141% of the statewide average, with rain from October to March 153% of average. The state's snowpack on April 1 was 237% of normal, only the fourth time it topped 200% of normal since 1950.

"This was, I think, as close to a miracle year as you can get after following just the intensity of drought conditions," DWR Director Karla Nemeth said.

She added, "We've always had intense variability in California. But the suddenness of the shift from very extreme dry to very extreme wet is something that we think needs additional research to understand how changes in the climate may have played a factor or not in that extreme shift."

Ernest Conant, regional director "The No. 1 operational priority is for the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation,

said federal officials are "pleased to go into this new water year in a much better place than we've been in the last few years."

Conant said, "Both our reservoirs as well as groundwater basins were able to be replenished nicely with excess flows from the winter storms.'

Ted Craddock, deputy director of the State Water Project, said the SWP was able to provide 100% water allocations this year to 29 water agencies. He noted, "This is the first time that's happened since 2006, and we were also able to provide an additional 400,000 acre-feet of water on top of that 100% allocation, which is really good news for water supply in the state."

Paul Gosselin, the state's deputy director for sustainable groundwater management, said storms this year helped replenish the state's depleted aquifers by more than 1.2 million acre-feet through groundwater recharge efforts.

But the state's improved water picture came at the cost of massive agricultural losses from flooding this year.

In Monterey County alone, officials estimated damage to crops and farm infrastructure at \$600 million. Hundreds of millions of dollars in agricultural losses were also reported in Kings and Tulare counties as storms resurrected the dormant Tulare Lake, submerging farmlands and dairy properties.

State and federal crews are racing to make repairs in anticipation of more storms to come.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is rebuilding three sections of the Pajaro River levee that failed in March, flooding the town of Pajaro and Monterey

County farm fields. State officials said they are investing \$52 million for levee repairs and local flood control projects in the ensuing months in hopes of preventing additional

flooding in the next water year. Gary Lippner, DWR's deputy director of flood management and dam safety, said the potential of new flooding "keeps me awake a little bit at night going into an El Niño year."

Last month, the National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration said there is a 95% probability that El Niño conditions will persist through January to March of 2024, with a 71% likelihood of strong weather impacts.

Nemeth said it is "absolutely critical" for water officials to keep a close eye on "long-duration forecasting" to plan for potential flood emergencies.

Yet Craddock of the State Water Project said officials also must plan "for both dry and wet scenarios." He said that means meticulous decisions on adjusting reservoir levels, whether releasing water for flood control or holding it back "in the event conditions turn dry."

After dealing with California's driest years on record from 2020 to 2022, Nemeth said the state was blessed with water abundance this year. But she said there were also abundant challenges in managing the water deluge.

"Mother Nature really helped us out, and she did help us out in a really, really big way in certain parts of the state," Nemeth said. "But there are always ways in which Mother Nature can throw us a curve ball, and we shouldn't expect that necessarily again. There's a lot of work to continue to be done, particularly when it comes to flooding and protecting our communities.'

The North County Fire Protection District will be contracting with Howells Government Relations to provide federal advocacy support services.

The contract was approved on a 5-0 NCFPD board vote Tuesday, Sept. 26. Howells Government Relations will be paid a \$7,500 monthly retainer along with reasonable expenses to represent the fire district.

"That was a big deal," NCFPD fire Chief Keith McReynolds said.

In August 2022, the NCFPD board approved a contract with Hoch Consulting for services to identify potential grant opportunities.

'Our hope is that we will be able to use Howells Government Relations to assist with advocacy," McReynolds said.

The Fallbrook Public Utility District has been contracting with Howells Government Relations since June 2022 and has received federal funding as a result of that partnership. The NCFPD agreement calls for Howells Government Relations to monitor and track federal activity and funding opportunities relevant to planned NCFPD projects, develop and execute a strategy to meet the fire district's federal funding, government relations and public outreach objectives and provide strategic counsel along with government and public relations assistance to the district.







# Wild Wonders celebrates the second anniversary of a special friendship







Lady Warrior Claire Nordeen sets the ball for her teammates. Fallbrook won the varsity girls volleyball game, 3-0.




Fallbrook's Allie Stelma serves the ball Village News/Shane Gibson photos during the varsity girls volleyball game against Ramona, Oct. 20.


school colors as teal and white," said Vallecitos School District Superintendent and Chief Business Officer Meliton Sanchez. "We are excited about that,"

He was also a revered patriarch, awarded "Master Pilot" by the FAA for over 60 years of flying without accident or violation, an accomplished tenor, successful businessman, avid snow skier, water sports enthusiast of all types: Air chair, kayak, canoe, snorkeler, scuba diver, water skier, and beloved boat captain; horseback rider, supporter of global ministries, world traveler and adventure seeker, voracious reader, leader in his Church.

Bryce was born in Denver, Colorado on Oct. 26, 1935, to Virginia and Byron

"Kes" Herndon. He grew up in Oregon with his two sisters, Karen and Betty, and graduated from Grants Pass High School in 1953. He attended Oregon State University and earned a B.S. in Business and a minor in Forestry.

Bryce knew he was destined to fly airplanes, so he also entered the ROTC college program in preparation to join the AirForce. He belonged to Kappa Sigma



Fraternity where he led his fellow brothers in singing competitions and won first place with "Sweet Kentucky Babe."

It was in college where he met and married his college sweetheart, Catherine Wiser, better known to all as Kay, or Kay-Bob, as Bryce would so lovingly call her. To his joy, a family was started with the birth of his daughter, Sheri, and a few years later his son, Scott.

After graduating from college, he joined the Air Force where he trained to be a fighter pilot. Bryce graduated top of his class and quickly rose to the level of Captain. He was commissioned to the 49th Tactical Fighter Wing, 7th squadron, where he was his squad's leader. He flew the most advanced fighter plane at the time, the F105 Thunderchief, known affectionately by pilots as the "Thud." Bryce flew over 45 fighter pilot missions over North Vietnam and then along the Russian border while stationed in

Germany. After discharge, he served in the Air Force Reserve for a short stint before getting hired as a pilot at American Airlines in 1965. He continued to fly for American for 30 years. When he had to take mandatory retirement in 1995, he bought himself a beautiful plane and continued to fly with family and friends. One

of his planes was called Hummer. Those who knew Bryce, knew that he loved to snow ski and water ski. Bryce would use his European layovers to ski in Switzerland, Germany or Austria. Winter vacations with the family often included snow skiing in the U.S. and around the world. 

# Healthy Habits for Bonsall & Fallbrook Folks: Carpal Tunnel Syndrome – Traffic at the nerve route

Chronic, lingering wrist pain that causes discomfort for daily living activities may be attributed to carpal tunnel syndrome. When pain, tingling and/or numbness is felt in some of the fingers, there can be nerve compression.

The uncomfortable feeling can be attributed to the median nerve. This nerve runs down the arm, through the wrist and to the fingers. The route the nerve takes is through the carpal "tunnel." Movement of all fingers, except the pinky, are controlled by this nerve. When swelling occurs, the "tunnel" becomes narrowed. There are about 200,000 cases of CTS per year in the U.S.

#### Repetition

We live in a world of repetition. Our hands are a vital part of many actions that we take. Most tasks require our hands, fingers and wrists. We write, type, put our shoes on, open doors, eat and the list of hand work could go on and on. These are the very repetitive movements that can lead to CTS, but other culprits include pregnancy, obesity, diabetes, arthritis and hypothyroidism.

Due to these conditions, the wrists are being asked to work under excess weight conditions or through hormonal imbalances that affect joint motion. It is more commonly found among women, possibly because the "tunnel" is naturally smaller. Certain jobs that have repetitive functions also increase the likelihood of CTS. These might include jobs such as a hairdresser, cashier, musician, baker or assembly line worker who does the same movement over and over.

#### **Symptoms**

When early detection is possible, a person might feel burning, itching or numbness in their palm or fingers. Your fingers might even fall asleep. This pain can travel up to the shoulder. If the symptoms increase you might lose your grip. Eventually strength in the wrist

There are a couple tests for CTS. Besides a doctor's general inspection of your wrist mobility, you can have a test called EMG-NCV done. It measures the degree of the median nerve function. Upon diagnosis a doctor might tell you to keep the wrist immobile. Using a splint can help lessen the pressure on the median nerve. It helps that nerve rest. Medications are available to help with the inflammation. Steroid shots can be done. Worst case scenario is surgery to correct the problem.

Even a teacher who grades paper

times we do these tasks, until suddenly they are painful. CTS doesn't happen overnight; it is the over and over use. Years later we might feel the side. Like most other elements of life, moderation is key. Take breaks and watch your form. Moderate your repeat functions. Keep the tunnel open and not backed up with traffic that leads to frustration and lack of movement

## Amino acids eliminate cravings for toxic junk food

Are you plagued with cravings for sweet, starchy, and fatty junk food? Despite the concerns that so many of us have about our diets, staying away from healthdestructive foods has been a losing battle. Today's mostly processed food diet contains little protein and lots of nutrient-void fats, sugars, and starches that intoxicate and addict the brain rather than nourish it.

Our brain's appetite chemistry is dependent on specific nutrients and the problem is that our foodaddicted brains are depleted in these same vital nutrients. We have almost completely overlooked the most potent nutrients of all when it comes to appetite control: the 20 amino acid powerhouses found in high-protein foods and as supplements.

As a licensed psychotherapist and an addiction and eating disorder specialist in San Francisco in the early 1980s, I was asked to create an outpatient treatment program for addicted adolescents and adults.

Within two years, our program for pot-addicted adolescents had spread into three counties and had an 80% success rate! Our adult program, however, was a complete failure. The crack cocaine epidemic had just hit, and all the addiction treatment programs in the country were experiencing the same 100% early dropout rates.

At around the same time, some addiction-focused neuroscientists started reporting that braingenerated cravings could be reduced using a few specific amino acids taken as supplements.

I had already been exploring the possibility that an improved diet and added vitamins and minerals might make a difference. But our crack-addicted clients rarely stayed around long, and those who did had ravenous cravings for junk food. Hoping to reduce their cravings for sugar as well as crack, we trialed two amino acids, which worked very effectively.

Our first client reported being almost cravings-free during his first week on these aminos. We had equal success later using these and a few other amino acids with clients addicted to alcohol, marijuana, and methamphetamine. So did hundreds of other addiction and mental health professionals, who began to enthusiastically recommend these amino acids to their clients.

In my virtual clinic, we have worked successfully with over 6,000 people who have been food cravers. To meet the massive modern food craving challenge, these clients have only needed 1-5 amino acids, taken as individual supplements. This simple regimen quickly corrects the primary deficiencies that propel most of their food cravings.

How individual amino acids worked for two of my clinic clients, Wendi and Don

Wendi, a 50-year-old diabetic, who was 70 pounds overweight, had glucose levels over 200. Within two days of taking two capsules of a single amino acid three times per day between meals, she reported that her glucose levels had dropped under 100 for the first time in years because she had lost all cravings for high-carbohydrate junk food.

Her equally carb-addicted and diabetic husband, Don, age 62, who also had prostate cancer, took two different amino acids three times per day, and easily switched to a healthy diet. Within a few months, his glucose levels had dropped to

under 100, and his prostate-specific antigen (PSA) levels went from 400 to less than 1.

What about foods that are high in amino acids?

The word "protein" indicates that the amino acid content of any food constitutes its primary value. Animal protein sources are much higher in aminos than most plant sources. Because the aminos stop their junk food cravings so quickly, our clients almost immediately drop their junk foods and start eating and enjoying a totally healthy diet.

Once the amino acid supplements have stocked up their appetiteregulating brain sites, high-protein foods alone, consumed three times per day, along with healthy fats and carbs, can keep their cravings at bay permanently – without the further use of amino supplements.

Below are the five specific individual aminos that help regulate our appetites, and also regulate our moods. Please note that free-form amino acids are more potent than any bound, food-based, amino supplements.

Tryptophan or 5-HTP are similar amino acids that can reduce Type 1 cravings, namely depressed, anxious, and sleepless cravings. They both convert into the neurotransmitter serotonin, our vital appetite, mood, and sleep regulator.

Glutamine eliminates Type 2 or crashed cravings and is the amino acid that Wendi (mentioned earlier) took. Because she skipped meals and relied on short-acting sweets and starches, her blood glucose levels often dropped too low, which set off frantic hypoglycemic carb cravings several times per day. Her brain converted the glutamine into just enough glucose to turn off those cravings almost instantly. Providing emergency glucose to myriad cells in the brain and body is just one of glutamine's extraordinary powers.

DPA (D-phenylalanine) increases our levels of the comforting, pleasurable, painkilling neurotransmitters called endorphins. Don (also mentioned previously) was a Type 3 comfort craver and took DPA to stop his cravings for comfort foods like chocolate and ice cream.

GABA is both an amino acid and a neurotransmitter that provides natural tranquility, relaxing our mind and our muscles by reducing adrenaline levels. Don was also a Type 4 stressed craver and used GABA top stop his stress cravings.

Tyrosine is used for fatigued Type 5 cravers. It also promotes muscle coordination and mental focus. Tyrosine was the enlivening amino that had such amazing effects on my clinic's exhausted crack addicts in 1986. People who crave energy from caffeine, chocolate, or sugar find tyrosine just as amazing.

While it's impossible to foresee all health issues that may require treatment, there are several things to consider during the Medicare Advantage and Prescription Drug Plan Annual Election Period, happening Oct. 15, through Dec. 7.

#### **Future health risks**

In addition to making sure your plan covers your current health needs, speak to your doctor about health risks that may require additional treatment. For instance, if you have prediabetes, consider the potential for future diabetes management.

#### Prescription drug benefits

# NCFPD adjusts ambulance fees

The North County Fire Protection District adjusted the fees charged for NCFPD ambulance calls.

A 5-0 NCFPD board vote Tuesday, Sept. 26, approved the new ambulance fee schedule. The fees will increase by approximately 7.5%.

"That's an annual inflator off of San Diego's CPI," NCFPD fire Chief Keith McReynolds said. "We can raise fees accordingly.'

In September 2016, the NCFPD board adopted a policy which provides an automatic annual rate increase for ambulance service based on the annual Consumer Price Index for San Diego County. The adjustments are applied annually July 1, and the district continues to conduct periodic reviews of the regional average fees within northern San Diego County to evaluate the effectiveness of the fee structure and determine if a change in fees above or below the automatic adjustments warrants NCFPD board consideration.

The California Health and Safety Code allows a special district to charge a fee to cover the cost of any service the district provides, and the California Vehicle Code allows fire agencies to recover costs related to responses for incidents on a public highway. In 2009, the North County Fire Protection District implemented a cost recovery program for vehicle incidents, and in August 2020, the NCFPD board expanded the cost recovery program to add false alarms. A revised cost recovery fee schedule was approved by the board in October 2020.

The 2020 review included ambulance fees, and the board changed the regional average from

fire-based agencies only to all transporting emergency medical service providers. Two-thirds of the increase became effective in November 2020, and the October 2021 board meeting addressed the final third.

The new basic life support transport fees will be \$1,464.10 for NCFPD residents and \$1,512.17 for non-residents. Advanced life support activity has treatment as well as transport fees. The non-transport treatment fee is \$226.83 for residents and \$249.40 for non-residents while if cardiopulmonary resuscitation is involved the fees increase to \$875.05 for a resident and \$903.00 for a non-

The non-transport Level 2 trauma fees are now \$691.23 for residents and \$770.78 for non-residents. The new transport fees for NCFPD residents will be \$2,437.50 for base advanced life support and \$2,646.04 for Level 2 advanced life support transport. Non-residents will be charged \$2,501.70 for base ALS transport and \$2,708.85 for Level 2 ALS transport. A mileage charge of \$41.80 per mile or fraction thereof will also be part of the fee.

The fees also include \$136.53 for a Level 1 disposables bundle, \$262.30 for a Level 2 disposables bundle, \$109.65 for oxygen and \$39.78 for an electrocardiogram. A night charge of \$65.58 is also part of the fee structure.

The district also has a Continued Quality Improvement Fee which is for the administrative time associated with processing electronic patient care reports. That fee was increased to \$139.75.

A new Getting to Zero Resource Guide is also available online and in print version in English and Spanish. **Rainbow Municipal Water District** Notice of Election November 7, 2023 - Measure "B"

On November 7, 2023, an election will be held within the Rainbow Municipal Water District (RMWD) on Measure "B" regarding the detachment of the RMWD from the San Diego County Water Authority. You have likely already received the County of San Diego "Voter Information Pamphlet and Sample Ballot" for this election. If you have not, you may obtain a copy at https://www.sdvote.com/content/rov/en/sample-ballot-info-lookup.html or you can contact the San Diego County Registrar of Voters at (800) 696-0136. The purpose of this letter is to satisfy legal requirements related to the Measure "B" election, which requires RMWD to provide mailed notice of the election to voters qualified to vote at the upcoming November 7, 2023,

On July 10, 2023, the San Diego Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) (by adoption of LAFCO Resolution No. 2023-12), approved the detachment/exclusion of the Rainbow Municipal Water District (RMWD) from the San Diego County Water Authority, which is RMWD's current wholesale water supplier, and the annexation of RMWD into the neighboring Eastern Municipal Water District (resulting in a switch to a new wholesale water supplier). LAFCO's approval was subject to various LAFCO-imposed terms and conditions (described in more detail below) which included a requirement that the voters within RMWD approve the detachment/exclusion from the San Diego County Water Authority. RMWD

voters will decide this issue at the November 7, 2023, election.

LAFCO's terms and conditions include submission to LAFCO of a final map of RMWD's territory, submission of checks making payment for various LAFCO and Board of Equalization fees, and if the RMWD voters approve detachment/exclusion, payment by RMWD of an exit fee of \$15,798,250.00 to San Diego County Water Authority, to be paid in five annual installments of \$3,159,650.00, with the first installment to be paid within 30 days of the certification of the results of the election, and the remaining installments to be paid on the anniversary of the initial payment. As stated in the record of LAFCO's proceedings, the exit fee was imposed by LAFCO to provide "net-revenue protection to the County Water Authority and its remaining member agencies for the first 60 months" following RMWD's detachment/exclusion from the San Diego County Water Authority. LAFCO estimates that if the detachment/exclusion of RMWD from the San Diego County Water Authority is approved and RMWD annexes to Eastern Municipal Water District, RMWD would realize approximately \$4.8 million in annual savings before the exit fee payment. 
